

### Y.M.C.A. REPORT SHOWS BIG GAINS

Y. M. C. A. BOARD OF DIRECTORS HAD BIG MEETING LAST NIGHT AND HEARD REPORTS OF THE VARIOUS DEPARTMENTS - BIG GAINS ARE REPORTED.

At the regular bi-monthly board meeting of the Y. M. C. A. board of directors, held at the association rooms last evening, the remarkable report of the physical department was a feature creating no little enthusiasm and interest among the business men who represent the association's directorate. Beginning with this week the association will have in all 22 gymnasium classes, which is six more class sessions than last year and four more sessions than any previous year. Class attendance for November and December show a total of 955 young men in 48 class sessions. The business men total 345, while the boys' department gymnasium attendance was 1,260. The total attendance at all class sessions was 2,560.

One hundred and eleven men have

all class sessions was 2,566.

One hundred and eleven men have attended three health talks, 397 men were in 15 special sessions of basket ball, and 253 men and boys participated in monthly athletic and equatic events. There were 16 games pulled off in the inter-church baseball games, with 145 participants. Seven Bible classes were conducted with an attendance of 266. There are now, also wrestling and boxing groups and a wrestling and boxing groups and a special tumbling club is being organied. Six teams are represented in the bowling league with a total of 39 men, and a total of 2,938 games were bowled. Eighty men are being lined up in eight teams in the annual pasket ball league, which opens on next Saturday night, while the boys' department is also conducting a special campaign of swimming. Grand Duke Nicholas.

Basil Miles in World's Work: At the feast of the Preobrazhenski regiment in St. Petersburg, shortly after the Russian-Japanese war, Sir Ian Hamilton was watching the great world arrive, one after another. He himself was present as a distinguished British general. Both individually and collectively the Russian guards are a fine lot. But he suddenly ejaculated, "By Jove, who's thaf?" He pointed to a towering figure, at least six feet four in height, with close-cropped, black hair chot through with gray; short, pointed Vandyke beard; keen eyes; extraordinary length of limb, but lean and graceful, with exceptional ease and power of movement—a magnificent figure of a man. It was the Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholaievitch.

The grand duke, now commander-inchief of the armies of Russia, was born the year after the Crimean war and was 58 last October. But he still radiates an impression of easy power and strength. His grandfather was the son of Czar Nicholas I, whose physique was famous in Europe. When a mob gathered in the Sadovaya, in those early days, a story is still current of how the great czar drove to the scene, got out of his carriage and strode out alone, gigantic and threatening, and with a single mighty roar produced a stunned silence through which he lectured the huddled crowd like a stern but just father and sent them away, tamed. His great-grandson inherits much of his physical power. Although the military career of the Grand Duke Nicholas has attracted little attention outside of Russia, largely because he has concentrated whole-heartedly on each phase as he met it, his present supreme command is nevertheless the logical result of a consitent rise through all ranks, not because, but almost in spite of, his imperial blood.
