Y. M. C. A. REPORT SILKS BIG GAINS

Y. M. C. A. BOARD OF DIRECTORS
HAD BIG MEETING LAST NIGHT
AND HEARD REPORTS OF THE
VARIOUS DEPARTMENTS—BIG
GAINS ARE REPORTED.

At the regular bi-monthly board meeting of the Y. M. C. A. directors, held at the association rooms last evening, the remarkable report of the physical department was a featured item. The report was a forecast of the coming year, which is expected to be a very successful one. Beginning with this week the association will have in all 22 gymnasium classes, which is a record. The total attendance for the year was 1,260. The total attendance at all classes was 1,260.

One hundred and eleven men have attended three health talks, 397 men were in 15 special sessions of basketball, and 253 men and boys participated in monthly athletic and aquatic events. There were 16 games played off in the inter-church baseball games, with 143 participants. Seven Bible classes were conducted with an attendance of 265. There are now also wrestling and boxing groups and a special tumbling club is being organized. Six teams are represented in the bowling league with a total of 39 men, and a total of 2,338 games were bowled. Eighty men are being lined up in eight teams in the annual basketball league, which opens on next Saturday night, while the boys' department is also conducting a special campaign of swimming. A vote of appreciation was extended to Gov. L. B. Hanna for the state of North Dakota. A vote of appreciation was also extended to A. L. Benarfa for the presentation of a beautiful bowling cup. A vote of appreciation was also extended to Assistant Physical Director Uphaw for his efficient management of all class work while Physical Director Poland was absent during the holidays.

The social committee of which Chester Belcher is chairman presented an unusual report. Twenty men are serving on the reception committee, looking after strangers and new members, promoting activities about the building and organizing the various social functions. The Thanksgiving dinner which was attended by seventy-six young men there were ten lunches and dinners served in the building during the month of December, with a total attendance of 186 men and boys. The social committee has been doing helpful work in trying to locate employment for a number of young men who have been out of work. These are high grade clean young men, most of whom have come into Fargo from Canada and the cotton belt; they are men of ability, clean in their habits, and worthy of the best interests of the association brotherhood.

Eighty men are lined up in Bible study work under the leadership of former General Secretary C. J. Allen. The boys department shows an increase in members and in receipts as against the same time of last year. The State Boys' conference is considered one of the most far reaching events so far in the year as connected with the association boys work program. The annual minstrel show, a Father and Son's bowling league and the boys' annual membership contest, are items that are now attracting the attention of the boys.

The educational department shows a total enrollment of seventy-eight men and boys in the evening school. The leadership of the chairman of the committee of this department, Mr. W. L. Stockwell, received high commendation. Twenty-two men are in the gas engine school with new men enrolling each day. H. W. Shaw, director of this department, also came in for high commendation.

Eight religious meetings were conducted, with a total attendance of 498. Herman Boeth, of the foreign work, is having been forwarded to the international committee for the support of the foreign work. The woman's auxiliary has presented the association with a new building. The Hubbard bequest, chairman of this committee, as now amounting to \$612.77. No benefits are derived from this fund as the association has not yet received the fund to accumulate from the interest and income.

The general department reported that the first time in the history of the association the general expense department had to secure and loan to the association a sum of money for the semi-annual interest, which matured Jan. 1 from the \$15,000 building fund. The association's subscription to general work for the past two months compared favorably with the same period of last year. The association's membership are considerably under the same period of last year. The management is making every effort to secure the bills regularly and the same time care for the added burden of building fund interest.

Basil Miles in World's Work: At the feast of the Preobrazhenski regiment, St. Petersburg, shortly after the Russian-Japanese war, Sir Ian Hamilton was watching the great world affair, one after another. He himself was present as a distinguished British general. Both individually and collectively the Russian guards were a lot. But he suddenly exclaimed, "By Jove, who's that?" He pointed to a towering figure, at least six feet four in height, with close-cropped black hair shot through with gray; short, pointed Van-dyke beard; keen eyes; extraordinary hunched growth like a giant but just father and sent them away, tamed. His great-grandson inherits much of his physical power. Although the military career of the Grand Duke Nicholas has attracted little attention outside of Russia, lately he has been a controversial wholeheartedly on each phase as he met it, his present supreme command is nevertheless the logical result of a consistent rise through all ranks, not because, but almost in spite of, his imperial blood.

Thinking Horses Die at Front. Paris cable to the New York Sun: When the war broke out the Prussian military authorities requisitioned the "thinking" horses of Elberfeld.
