For cenland, Oregon, the general interest in the early history of our state, closely connected with their exploration of our country, is vividly aroused. Our mind is led back to the times, when the prairies, now bearing cultivated crops, were dotted with the herds of the buffalo and with abundant game of every kind natural to our region. We think of the wild free people, who claimed this vast dominion once their Wilton and their 1480 lb. cows! Frank own, undisturbed by the tread of the Vogel sold one to a local butcher the pale face. Urged on by the striving spirit of civilized men, our thoughts dwell with curiosity on the subject of the greatest interest, now before us, and we become desirous of learning more distinct facts about the past, of our predecessors of the country and the nations we have conquered by the continuous incessant advance of civilization. Among the many questions to be answered, one of the foremost is "The origin of the Mandan Indians," which is shrouded in mystery. Historians of our times are puzzled over the solution of the riddle, and no facts have been constituted through ages, no certainty is arrived at. We of North Dakota hold the last with Dr. Bunting for the construction end of the thread of the life of that peculiar tribe of Mandans and may praise us lucky, envied by many, to be able to trace part of its history, by the signs and tokens left behind them; by its ancient remains we find by researches within our own boundaries. Further we can not go unless intruding on other states' privileges. But now the question arises, "Where did the Mandans come from, where and how did they originate?" There is the puzzle and there is a field of exploration before the zealous historians, ethnologists and archaeologists of other neighboring and farther states, which task may ask of a man more of his pains, than he is disposed to give. And we counted thirty-one teams tied up after all-mystery still may prevail.

The Mandans were a distinctly and vastly different tribe from all other tribes of Indians in the Northwest. Thanks to Geo. Bertha Brenain says the very ancient Irish book of Lismore contains the story of St. Brendan's seven years' voyage on the seas west of Ireland in Latin, called "Navigato," of which copies are to be seen in the libraries of the Vatican, Paris, and other prominent libraries. Gen. Dan Butterfield of the civil war found thirteen copies of "Navigatio" in the National Abrary at Paris France

De Rod (American) in his "The History of America before Columbus." De Costa (American) in his "Pre-Columbian Discoveries" Moosmueller (German) in his "Europeans in America before Columbus" and other historians testify to the genuineness and credibility of these old Skandinaians Sagas.

Old maps exist of "St. Brendans Land" or "Great Ireland" or "Whiteman's Land," for instance one in the library of Twin Holy made in the 10th century; another map by Honorius Autum in 1130; another "The World's Image," by Robert d' Auxerre in 1265; and others among which one of the most remakable may be noted as that made by the Arabian geographer Edrisi in the 11th century, who calls "Great Ireland" "Ifelando el Kibarah." All these maps show "St. Brendans Land."

Ferdinand St. Denise (quoted by Montelambert) tells us that Columbus himself, who knew of the former "Great Ireland," wrote before his discovery: "The land of St. Brendan is the Land of the Blessed' towards the West, which no one can reach except by the power of God."
