Sealed proposals will be received at the office of the Warden of the North Dakota State Penitentiary, until the 2nd day of June, 1911, at 10 o'clock a. m., at which time and place the bids will be opened in the presence of the bidders, for furnishing supplies for the year ending June 30, 1912, to be delivered at said penitentiary upon the requisition of the Warden, at such time and in such quantities as may be designated by him.

No bid will be considered which is not accompanied by a certified check for \$200.00 payable to the Warden of the Penitentiary, as a guarantee of good faith, which check will be returned as soon as the contract has been awarded and the bond approved.

The successful bidder will be required to enter into a contract in writing and give a bond sufficient to guarantee the faithful performance of the contract, not to exceed \$3,000.00.

Bids will be made on estimates; the successful bidder must contract to furnish the requirement of the institution for one year, be it more or less. Estimates will be furnished on application to the undersigned.

Separate bids and contracts may be made for: 1st, coal and slack; 2nd, canned goods; 3rd, coffee and tea; 4th, groceries and grocer's supplies. Each article must be itemized and listed with price.

TERMS: All bills must be audited and approved by the Board of Trustees at the regular monthly meeting.

Payment to be made in cash according to the rules prescribed by law in such cases.

S. acted wisely as their sure defeat today would no doubt mean a great loss in the gate receipts in tomorrow's game with New Salem.

As soon as this decision was reached the management of the U. C. T. team immediately communicated with official umpire Oscar Nelson, of Minneapolis who, after severely criticizing the action of the White Sox, acting in compliance with the rules, declared the U. C. T. team winner by the score of 9 to 0. This leaves the U. C. T. team with a perfect record so far this season.

FINLAYSON AND GANDY ARE FOUND GUILTY

VERDICT RETURNED BY THE JURY AT 7:30 O'CLOCK LAST EVENING.

Boarding Car Robbers Plead Guilty--Sentences Will Be Pronounced by Judge on Monday Morning.

The jury in the case of the State vs. Frank Finlayson and George Gandy, charged with violation of the state prohibition law, were found guilty by a jury which reported at 7:30 last evening. Sentence will be pronounced by Judge Winchester on Monday morning.

Boarding Car Robbers.

Edward Crane, Frank Howard and Howard Bonde, who were arrested at Driscoll last month charged with breaking into a boarding car on the Northern Pacific tracks at that place, were before the court following the sending of the Finlayson-Gandy case, and pleaded guilty. They will also be sentenced Monday morning with the others who have been found guilty.

These three men will have to serve time in the penitentiary for their infraction of the law.

Another Big Case.

This morning the jury as secured in the case of the State vs. John Garret, charged with the violation of the prohibition law. Garret has been employed as a hack driver for Hinkley and is one of the men who were in the hack last fall that was struck by a locomotive at the Fifth street crossing of the Northern Pacific. He was laid up all winter and lost a case for damages against the Northern Pacific at the spring term of the federal court held in this city. The case will probably be completed today as the securing of the jurors was gotten through with in a hurry this morning.

MILWAUKEE COMPANY HAS FILED A DEED

PARENT COMPANY SELLS TO THE CHICAGO, MILWAUKEE AND PUGET SOUND.

Deed Filed in Office of Secretary of State--No Change in Business Policy Will Result.

There has been filed in the office of the secretary of state, P. D. Norton, a deed which conveys from the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul road to the Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound road, all its lines in North Dakota that part of the line in North Dakota is the new transcontinental road which was but recently completed and runs through the southwestern corner of the state. It also includes another small strip of road which has been in existence in the state for several years and touches at Linton.

This will not mean any change in the business policy of the new line and is a move that has been expected since the new line was first started. The Chicago, Milwaukee and Puget Sound road will be an active bidder for transcontinental business in the future.

RY. COMMISSIONERS MEETING AT FINLEY

MANAGER OF FARMERS ELEVATOR COMPANY SKIPPED OUT WITH FUNDS.

Commissioner Will Look After Interests of the Patrons of the Elevator Company.

The members of the North Dakota railroad commission are meeting today at Finley, where they are looking after the affairs of the Farmers Elevator company of that place. It appears that the manager of the company has left for parts unknown and there are outstanding tickets amounting to 12,000 bushels, besides 10,000 bushels to a commission house in Minneapolis. The elevator is valued at about \$5,000 clear of liens, and the cash on hand is about \$1,400. The manager had a bond to the company for \$2,500, and of course the company has a bond to the state.

The commissioners thought the matter of enough importance to go to Finley and look into the matter and get the affairs of the concern straightened out if that is possible. The bond to the state is only for \$5,000.

The first game of the season of the 63-Mile League to be played on the local diamond will occur Sunday afternoon when the Bismarck White Sox will meet the fast team from New Salem. This game is the one for which the local fans have been waiting for weeks and weeks and the big day is nearly at hand.

The game Sunday promises to be one of the best pitchers' battles ever witnessed in the capital city. Last Sunday when the two teams fought it out on the New Salem diamond, each of the opposing twirlers struck out seventeen of the opponents who faced him. It is confidently expected that this record will be duplicated tomorrow.

Another feature of the game Sunday is that it is the opening of the new league park at the capital city. Bismarck now boasts one of the best little baseball parks there is in the state and the work on the grounds and the grandstand has just been completed. There is ample room for 1200 spectators and they will all be assured of a comfortable place from which to witness the contest.

During the game last Sunday, New Salem was weakened by the absence of two of her best players, but they are back in the harness for the contest Sunday. They are expecting to turn the tables on the capital city bunch, while the local aggregation is equally certain that no such disastrous event shall occur. STATE NORMAL BOARD TO HOLD 2 MEETINGS

WILL DECIDE ON LOCATION FOR NEW NORMAL SCHOOL AT MINOT ON TUESDAY.

Meeting Scheduled for Valley City on Monday, When Plans for New Building Will Be Gone Over.

There are two important meetings of the State Normal board of trustees scheduled for next week.

The first one will be held at Valley City, Monday, when the board will meet for the purpose of going over the plans for the new building that is to be erected there this summer, and the second meeting will be at Minot, when it is hoped that some decision can be reached regarding the location of the new Normal school which is to be built there and for which an appropriation was made at the last session of the legislature.

This matter has been postponed several times on account of an inability of the parties interested to agree on a suitable site. It is expected, however, that some sort of a compromise will be arrived at on Tuesday.
