**BIGGEST AND MOST SPECTACULAR PAGEANT EVER SEEN ON THE
STREETS OF CAPITAL CITY WILL OCCUR THURSDAY AT 2:30
P. M.—PROCESSION HAS BEEN DIVIDED INTO SIX SECTIONS—

LINE OF MARCH.
Parade forms at Thayer and Tenth
streets.
Starts at 2:30 p. m.
Marches west on Thayer to Second
street.

South on Second to Broadway.
East on Broadway to Seventh.
South on Seventh to Main.
West on Main to Custer park, where
it will disband.

FLOATS TO FORM.

All floats will form in line on
Thayer street between Sixth, Sev-
enth and Eighth streets, with
the left resting on South Thayer.
No crossings must be blocked.

The second of the big industrial
parades which will be given during the
Industrial Exposition will occur on
Thursday afternoon and promises to
completely eclipse the first proces-
sion. The parade will be headed by
the famous musical organization of
the Fourteenth United States Infantry.
There will be six sections of the pa-
rade, each under the supervision of
competent marshals.

The parade will not start until 2:30
owing to the fact that the special
trains over the Soo line do not arrive
until 2:15 p. m. The line of march
will be the same as that of the first
parade. Grand Marshal Casselman is
in charge of the procession and has
been laboring earnestly to make this
the greatest and most spectacular
pageant ever witnessed on the streets
of Bismarck.

MARKET DAY WILL BRING BIG CROWDS

Saturday, October 7, will be the
last market day of this year and
those in charge of it are doing their
best to make it the biggest success
they have yet attained.

The prizes offered are \$2.50 for
the best half bushel of corn and \$2.50
for the best half bushel of onions.

early and take their pick, as bargains
don't last long after they once get
started on the market day.

HEAVY WIND STORM DOES MUCH DAMAGE

The decorations of the exposition
City look somewhat bedraggled this
morning after the high wind of Tues-
day. The weather bureau reports
that the wind at one time yesterday
reached a rate of sixty-two miles an
hour and that the highest velocity for
five consecutive minutes was fifty-
six miles per hour.

Some of the brick work of the Da-
kota Block was blown into the street,
narrowly missing some pedestrians
that happened to be on the sidewalk
below; the flag pole on Baker's Hall
was torn loose and caused another
narrow escape from accident when it
fell just a few inches in front of an
oncoming team. Several windows
throughout town were blown in in-
cluding one at the high school and
one at the capital building. A num-
ber of trees were also blown down.

The weather bureau, however,
states that tomorrow is bound to be
good weather and those who come
here for Soo Line Day at the Expo-
sition will be sure of an excellent
day for their visit.
