## M'KENZIE HOTEL IS BIG ADVERTISEMENT FOR CITY

HELENA CAPITALISTS OFFER LANDLORD PATTERSON BONUS OF \$150,000 IF HE WILL REPRODUCE BUILDING AT MONTANA CAPITAL---COMPANY HAS ALREADY BEEN FORMED THERE TO BUILD NEW HOTEL --- MONTANANS ARE GREATLY PLEASED WITH NORTH DAKOTA'S CAPITAL CITY.

O. M. Lanstrum and T. A. Marlow of Helena, Mont., business men and capitalists, were in the city yesterday the guests of the McKenzie. The gentlemen represent a syndicate and are looking about with a view of determining upon a hotel. They visited Devils Lake, Grand Forks and finally went to the Twin Cities to look at different hotel structures. They heard of a new hotel being built in Rochester, Minn., and had a look at it.

While in consultation with some business men in St. Paul they incidentally mentioned their mission. "Why don't you look over the McKenzie at Bismarck?" inquired a gentleman who visited this city during the Industrial Exposition. The gentleman was so loud in his praise of the hotel that they became impressed and concluded to stop here on the way home.

Armed with a letter to Landlord Patterson, they dropped in yesterday morning, making their wants known. Mr. Patterson showed the gentlemen his big hotel from the basement to the seventh floor, and when they reached the lobby after the tour they declared a reproduction of the McKenzie is just what they are looking for.

"We have nothing to approach it in Helena," with our 17,000 population. As the state capital we need just such a hotel with 25 additional rooms."

Mr. Patterson got out his automobile yesterday and showed his distinguished visitors the sights of interest around Bismarck. They were

pleased with the city, admired its streets, fine residence and business houses, but more than all they were taken with the McKenzie hotel.

To a representative of the Tribune last night the gentlemen said: "We want a reproduction of the McKenzie hotel in Helena. We have a company organized and financed for the purpose of constructing such a building and we are going to have it. Our stockholders are all business men and are occupied with their own affairs. They have no time to look after the details of hotel building. Mr. Lanstrum and myself are authorized to speak for them and I have this statement to make: If Mr. Patterson will reproduce the McKenzie with 25 additional rooms in Helena, we will give him a bonus of \$150,000, and we are ready to guarantee the payment of that sum to his satisfaction. This is what we think of the McKenzie and of Mr. Patterson as a hotel builder."

Mr. Patterson says the offer is tempting but the responsibilities of such an undertaking are great. He is not yet over the worries and trials of the McKenzie and life is too short to assume such obligations. The gentleman feels flattered by the praises he has received over his achievement, but he has no desire to engage in another such an enterprise for many years to come.

Mr. Marlow is the owner of the Montana Record, published at Helena, besides having other large interests. Mr. Lanstrum is a business man and capitalist of the same city. They left for home last night.

## PRELIMINARY DEBATE DATES ARE ARRANGED

TWENTY HIGH SCHOOLS ARE ENTERED IN STATE INTER-SCHOLASTIC CONTEST

Great Difficulty in Pairing Teams--First Debates Occur on Eighth of December.

The high schools which have entered the third annual debating contest for the Grand Forks Herald cup were matched for the preliminary debate. Twenty schools from all sections of the state have entered and the pairing of them was no easy task. Much care was needed to pair the schools between which there were convenient railroad facilities and at the same time not have schools meet which contested last year.

The schools as arranged are: Westhope vs. Rugby; Leeds vs. Minnewaukan; Onkes vs. Wahpeton; Devils Lake vs. Michigan; Kenmare vs. Williston; St. Thomas vs. Grafton; Minot vs. Harvey; Hatton vs. Park River; Valley City vs. Buffalo, and Hillsboro vs. L'Moure. One of the debates which will attract considerable attention is that between Leeds and Minnewaukan. Leeds won the championship cup two years ago and Minnewaukan is the present champion. One of the losses of the year is the fact that Casselton will not enter. Casselton has for the past two years been in the final debate.

The date set for the preliminary debate is December 8, following this contest, the winners will be again matched for the second series. The final debate will be held at the state University at Grand Forks May 17.

## PINGREE BRANCH WILL TERMINATE AT WILTON

REPORTS THAT ROAD MIGHT BE EXTENDED THROUGH TO BISMARCK ARE ERRONEOUS--NORTHERN PACIFIC IS AT PRESENT TIME GRADING FOR A "Y" AND IS BUILDING ITS TERMINAL--FORMER REPORT WAS THAT TRAINS WERE COMING DOWN OVER 800 TRACKS

There has been some talk that the N. P. railway company would use the Soo tracks to Bismarck from Wilton, with its Pingree-Wilton branch trains. Such reports are erroneous. The N. P. is grading for a "Y" and is building a terminal at Wilton and that will undoubtedly be the terminal.

Division Supt. Derrick, of the Soo, when seen today concerning the rumors, said there was nothing in them so far as he was advised. He said farther he could see no advantage to the N. P. in making such arrangement as the traffic for the present would be light over the Wilton-Pingree branch and schedules could be arranged to connect with the Soo trains which would accommodate passengers almost as well as though the trains on the branch came through as far as Bismarck.

The feeling in Bismarck that it would be an advantage to the railway employes to make terminals at Mandan on account of the cheap rents across the river and they would have access to the Bismarck stores where they would do their trading anyway. In this way Mandan could be regarded as an industrial suburb of Bismarck, the position she really occupies now.

It may be that traffic arrangements with the Soo will be made later on whereby the Pingree-Wilton trains will be brought into Bismarck and sent on to Mandan for terminal purposes. This arrangement would be entirely satisfactory to Bismarck residents and to the Soo company.

Work on the terminal tracks at Wilton is now well under way.
