WORTH KNOWING

To remove brown stains from earthenware dishes and plates, caused by putting them in the oven, soak in strong borax and hot water.

To keep moths from the box or chest of drawers, sprinkle the contents with white cloves. This is better than camphor or cedar dustings.

To clean nickle trimmings, etc., moisten common soda with enough vinegar to make a paste, spread over the nickle and polish with a flannel cloth.

When ironing delicate garments put powdered orris root between the folds of the ironing blanket. A delicate perfume will permeate the clothing.

To test tea, burn a quantity on a tin plate. Good tea will leave a small amount of ashes, the quantity increasing as the quality of the sample deteriorates.

Grease the upper edges of a stew pan with a bit of butter to prevent the contents of the pan boiling over, whether it be cereals, chocolate, syrup or milk.

To make boots waterproof melt together two parts of beeswax to one part of mutton fat. Apply this to the leather at night and in the morning wipe well with a piece of flannel.

Table cloths that have become too much worn for further use may be turned into breadcloths and silver polishers. For either purpose they are more satisfactory than anything else.

A little pinch of salt improves everything, especially ice cream, custards and all sweet dishes. Tea and coffee are improved in taste, but the amount of salt must be very small.

An earthenware casserole, or any dish, should be soaked in salty soda water for 24 hours before using, so as to avoid cracking. Treated thus its term of usefulness will be prolonged.

During the pioneer days of this country no such provision was made and during hard winters, when the snow was deep as it is this year, there were sometimes great losses. This season the snow has not been trusted and the two and three year old steers are still grazing in the Bad Lands and on the pastures in the Berthold reservation north of this city and are looking well.
