

Government Tells Britons to Pinch, Save, Sacrifice!

Big Posters Bellow at English Men and Women to Give Up Vacations and Wear Their Old Clothes, But Nobody Pays Any Attention, Says Russell.

London, Eng., Sept. 19.—"To dress extravagantly in war time is worse than bad form; it is unpatriotic!" So bellow at you, from most of the big billboards of London now, posters in big type.

It is only one of 1,000 urgent commands given in big posters, little posters, sermons, editorials and Hyde Park oratory.

Save money! That's the idea. Deny yourself. Cut pie. Give up your vacation. Pinch. Save. It is the king's wish and the government's order.

I judge from these appeals that pleasure amounts to treason felony and that a moment's pleasure now may cost the empire.

One of the most startling of the posters asks:

Are You Helping the Germans? Then the poster explains you are guilty of this crime if you spend money in any of several specified ways.

A poster addressed to women and headed "Bad Form in Dress" condemns the fair sex for not heeding the government's demand to wear old dresses and things.

You can imagine how these appeals would fill with ecstasy the souls of all storekeepers, dressmakers and tailors—if anybody paid any attention to them.

But nobody does.

Economy? London never was so extravagant. It dances down the war road flinging money away with both hands.

Except for the millions of poor sobs at the bottom everybody has it and everybody spends it. If the war

At an economy exhibition held in London, says Russell, Britons were shown things about saving. Here are some of the pointers given the people:
Don't peel potatoes.

is to be won by their self-denial, as some editorial donkeys solemnly assert, it will never be won.

Meantime, the poor and some others can refresh themselves by contemplating the rising price lists. I wrote a month ago that the cost of living had increased 61 per cent. The increase has now reached 65 per cent.

In August, 1914, household coal sold at \$8.50 a ton. It now sells at \$10.60. Beef has jumped from 18 cents to 36 cents a pound in the two years. Bacon 16 to 38, milk 6 to 10, butter 24 to 36, flour 4 to 8, bread 10 to 18, coffee 24 to 32, sugar 5 to 12.

Clothing has increased 65 per cent in price.

There is growing agitation to have the government take over the food supplies.

Apparently, the government is not impressed. It did attempt to check the soaring price of coal. But the miners, by strikes and threats of more strikes, had secured increases in wages. So the mine owners demanded the right to boost prices. The government agreed and prices soared another 62 cents a ton, wholesale, to be fol-

lowed by still another advance when winter comes.

Writing about the causes of popular discontent and unrest in Holland, I said one of the most serious facts was that while the cost of living was always mounting upon the workers they saw with growing disgust the great corporations making fabulous profits from war conditions.

Take a look, then, at this list, casually compiled, of a few of the profits being made by British concerns able to bask in or near the sunlight of war contracts:

The Albion Steam Coal company increased profits from \$120,470 in 1914 to \$220,680 in 1916; Lockett's Colliery, from \$592,000 to \$1,080,325; The English Sewing Cotton company, from \$376,300 to \$2,115,835; the Forestal Land company, from \$1,916,810 to \$4,504,735; the Spillers and Baker company, flour, from \$446,755 to \$1,087,080.

Similar profits are being piled up all about the country by corporations and individuals already rich.

How long can this go on, with the cost of living rising day by day? But anyway, save your potato peelings!

FLEETING PROSPERITY IS FOOL'S PARADISE

Don't Let Smoke From Munition Factories Cloud Your Brain With Belief It's Abiding.

PROTECTION, OUR BULWARK

Forget Not the Dire Conditions Which Depressed This Country Under the Democratic Free Trade Tariff Prior to the War—They Will Return to Plague and Hunger You Unless the Republicans Are Restored to Power.

"When we contemplate industrial and commercial conditions," says Mr. Hughes, "we see that we are living in a fool's paradise." This is the condition to which the administration and its supporters have deliberately closed their eyes. When the war cloud broke over Europe, this country was experiencing the most serious depression it had known since 1893, when the Democratic party and its policies were in full control of the United States.

Suddenly there came from over the sea a demand for munitions of war, clothing, food, supplies, everything needed by vast armies and by countries whose sons were taken from the field and the workshop, never to return.

As a result our exports and the balance of trade in our favor have reached figures far surpassing any ever before known. Temporarily, especially in the East, there is no lack of work at high wages, for Europe must pay whatever price America asks. No thoughtful person would imagine that this condition is anything like real prosperity. How false it is, we in Oregon, who have the clearer vision, because not clouded by the smoke from munitions factories, have fully felt and fully appreciated.

What the Republican candidate for president says about it the Democrats know to be true:

"Our opponents promised to reduce the cost of living. This they have failed to do, but did reduce the opportunities of making a living. Let us not forget the conditions that existed in this country under the new tariff prior to the war. Production had decreased; business was languishing; new enterprises were not undertaken; instead of expansion there was curtailment and our streets were filled with the unemployed."

The suspension of these conditions is not nation-wide, only sectional, and depends upon the duration of the war. Those who think otherwise are, indeed, living in a fool's paradise.—Portland (Ore.) Telegram.

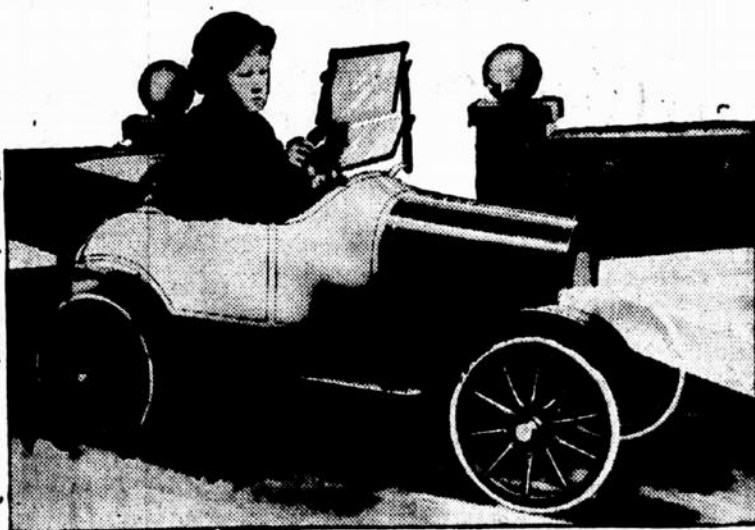
