Jack Monroe's Famous Right Will  
Never Work Again; War Got Him

Jack Monroe, whose name will go down in pugilistic history as the only man who ever knocked Jim Jeffries off his feet when Jeff was in his prime, will never bounce his right fist off another jaw-bone.

Jack has just returned from Europe, where as a member of the famous Princess Pat regiment, he received wounds in his shoulder which paralyzed his right arm.

Monroe joined the crack Canadian regiment a few days after war was declared and was the first Canadian soldier to set foot in France, leaping from the boat before it reached the landing and swimming to shore.

While his regiment was rapidly decimated in early engagements in Flanders, Monroe escaped serious wounds. But last fall a piece of shrapnel buried itself in his shoulder, permanently disabling him.

After his convalescence Monroe started from England but was delayed between boats in Liverpool, when his collic, "Bobbie Burns," mascot of the Princess Pats, became separated from him on the docks. Monroe hunted for the dog for two days and took the next boat.

Monroe's career in the ring was meteoric. He first achieved fame in December, 1902, when he met Jeffries in a four-round bout at Butte, Mont.

Jeff was meeting all comers in

four-round bouts, and paying a forfeit in case he did not knock them out.

Jeff had been so successful that he became careless and when he met Monroe he left an opening which the Pennsylvania giant was not slow in taking advantage of. In the fourth round he caught Jeff on the point of the jaw and

knocked him to the floor.

Almost two years later Jeff had his revenge by knocking out Monroe in two rounds in San Francisco.

Monroe retired from the ring in 1906 and went to Ellik City, Ont., where he was elected mayor, a position he held until shortly before he went to the front.

Far away from home we were cleaning up. In fact business was great with the salesmen on the road.

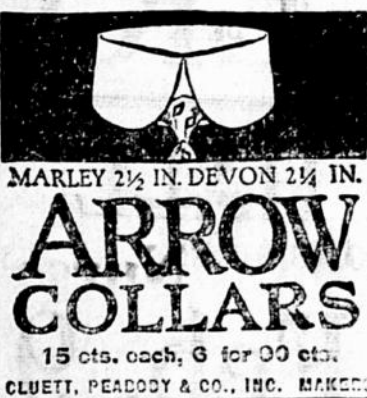

New York, Feb. 9.—A long time ago, when boxers were getting no more money for their labors than they were entitled to, there was a budding young lightweight hanging around Omaha, Kansas City and St. Joseph, Mo. He grew into a welterweight, but he persisted in just hanging around.

This youth never set the world afire with his accomplishments, but it was said he could take more punches and come back quicker than any man alive. It also was said of him that a fairer, cleaner boxer never stepped under the ropes of a ring. He fought Clarence English, a boxer of just the opposite type, and Clarence admitted he had taken a big job on his hands in punishing the youngster. English, at that time, was one of the best lightweights in the game—and one of the trickiest.

Time went on and the youth gradually quit fighting. He couldn't whip anything who amounted to anything. Then one day he listened to a street evangelist and a new fight was on.

Rev. Kid Wedge started from there and he has been knocking out the devil ever since.

Recently there came the news from Rhinelander, Wis., that Kid Wedge had applied for and been granted a license to conduct boxing bouts in a church of which he was pastor. Rev. Wedge, himself, stated that he was going to teach the young boys in his Sunday school how to box. Spectators and boxers will be members of the church and the Sunday school.

"HURRY-UP" YOST CRITICIZED FOR NOT  
PRODUCING WINNING TEAMS

The favor of kings is no more fickle than the favor of the American sporting public.

Following two rather unsuccessful years, part of the faculty and student body at Michigan are demanding that Fielding "Hurry Up" Yost be supplanted as football coach there.

Prof. J. J. Cox charges that Michigan's failure to win its big game is due to the lack of new coaching methods.

Other students who believe the poor machines Yost has turned out recently were due to a scarcity of material, are lining up behind the coach.

Yost for many years has been considered one of the greatest football mentors in the country. He turned out teams for many years that were unbeatable in the west. He developed such stars as Heston, Schultz, Benbrook, Wells and Maulbetsch, and for many years his attacks were considered practically invincible.

Yost's first great defeat came four years ago when his team was beaten by the Michigan Aggies. The 1915 and 1916 seasons were both unsatisfactory.
