These ladies, with Mrs. Conklin, general chairman, constitute the women's division of the North Dakota State council of defense, with which they will cooperate in the promulgation of patriotic doctrines and in the extension of war work.

### SURGICAL DRESSING BUREAU DEMONSTRATES ITS VALUE

The surgical dressing department of the Burleigh county Red Cross chapter has shipped to the Northern division headquarters at Minneapolis a large consignment of completed supplies, including 1050 compresses, 100 pads and 65 bandages. "This," said Miss Agnes Orr, in charge of the surgical dressing department, today, "is the result of only 20 days' work with

a few faithful workers who realize the urgent need for this work. Now that a large class have just completed training and are competent to supervise, many more workers could be instructed, and the people of Bismarck should realize the necessity of giving some of their time to this most important department of the Red Cross activities. It is a work that both men and women can do."

### MENOKEN RED CROSS UNIT ORGANIZED THIS AFTERNOON

A Menoken branch of the Red Cross chapter of Burleigh county is being organized this afternoon at the Menoken town hall, which will be Red Cross and loyalty headquarters. Mrs. J. L.
