

RUSSIANS CAN'T AGREE ON WHAT AILS THEM

BUT EVERY FACTION'S SURE EVERY
OTHER GROUP'S ALL BOLSHEVIK

The Russians themselves don't know what is the matter with their country. And the most annoying thing about the whole Russian situation is the assurance with which each representative of a different faction will tell you his point of view is right and all who oppose it are Bolsheviks.

Take the case of M. Sazanoff, representing in Paris the governments of Siberia, Omsk, Yaba and Crimea. Sazanoff used to be Russian ambassador to France. He makes his headquarters at the old Russian embassy here and has been trying to get powers to treat as allies those Russians who are repudiated by the Bolshevik government. He talks English perfectly.

I told Sazanoff there was a great deal of Bolshevik propaganda being spread through the United States. "It is of no consequence," said Sazanoff, dismissing it as if I had said a fly was walking on the garden wall. "Bolshevism cannot last."

"All right," I said, "but some of us don't like this thing in America. We believe in scotching the snake before there's nests of them all over the country."

My Word Enough, Says Mr. Sazanoff.

Sazanoff shrugged his shoulders and looked as if he had an urgent appointment. Then I told him I wanted to get hold of some writings of a man who had bitterly attacked Bolshevism, a man whose name was known in the United States and who would be believed.

"What! That fellow!" exclaimed Sazanoff. He's a dreamer. He's a fool!

"I've told the people of the world all about Bolshevism. I warned them. They know what I say. That is enough. They must believe! I am an authority!"

I refrained from telling him something he probably never suspected. That most of the people in the United States had never heard of him.

A Lenin and Trotsky in Every Village.

Sazanoff told me his views of Bolshevism.

He talked of its terrorism and its tyranny. He said it would do no good to kill Lenin or Trotsky, because "every village has its Lenin and Trotsky."

He said they were making no munitions; that the munitions belonging to the imperial government, bought when Russia was fighting on the side of the allies, had been seized—but would eventually run out.

"I know this," he said, impressively. "A big famine is coming in Russia—the worst in the history of the world. No land is being tilled. The people are land greedy. They grab it. They want it even if they haven't time to till it."

"They're all idle. They don't know—neither the big land grabbers nor the little land grabbers—whether the land is theirs or not from day to day. The Bolsheviks tell them they don't know whether it's true."

"Somebody else comes along and grabs it from them. The man with 100 hundred acres becomes just as bad. In the eyes of the Bolsheviks, the peasant, as the man with 5000 or 50,000 acres."

Rush for Jobs.

No Work to Do.

Workers were promised a five-hour day and double pay. There was a big rush for jobs. Then it was found the factories had no work to do.

"Famine? There can't be anything else under such terrible conditions. Just before I left Crimea I met a man who just came from Petrograd—a city the population of which has sagged from 2,000,000 to 700,000."

"This man saw hundreds of horses lying in the streets, where they had

dropped and died of starvation. He saw ragged people come from the houses, people with wretched faces and tear chunks of meat from one side of the horses, while snarling dogs gnawed at the other sides! Not a pretty picture, eh?"

Sazanoff undoubtedly was right about the terrors and the tyrannical

and the idleness and the hunger and famine under Bolshevik rule. But what gets me is why he calls everybody else either a Bolshevik or a fool or a dreamer—why he doesn't let all decent people in Russia add their voices behind that horn that will blow the correct information around the world and stop Bolshevik propaganda everywhere?

McDonnell, following the death of his little daughter, attempted to se-

cure a coffin and bury her without the knowledge of officials, it developed. The father journeyed to Berg & Christenson, Courtenay undertakers, and attempted to purchase a small casket. When advised that he must procure a death certificate and burial permit, he stated that he did not think it necessary.

McDonnell then attempted to obtain such certificates from a Kental physician, his request being refused. He then appealed to Dr. Gilbert of Courtenay, who advised him that he would first have to view the body. Dr. Gilbert, journeyed to the McDonnell home, saw the bruised and battered condition of the remains of little Etta, and promptly notified State's Attorney Carr and Coroner T. L. DePuy of this city.

There were 28 bruises on the little girl's body, and the heels of the feet

had been frozen to such an extent that they rotted away.

In the event the McDonnell case does come up for trial it has been indicated "a change of venue will be asked, sentiment being such in Stutsman county that it would be a difficult task to secure a jury."
