The officials will also investigate the matter of opposition in this section to negroes settling on claims and in the towns of the new country.

SCHLEY RULING SOON.

Within Forty-Eight Hours President May Decide.

New York, Jan. 16.—President Roosevelt will, unless he changes his present plans, dispose of the appeal of Admiral Schley in forty-eight hours, says a Washington dispatch to the Herald. His action, he is confident, will settle the naval controversy.

In making such prompt disposition of the appeal of the rear admiral, Mr. Roosevelt will surprise not only the appellant, but also the navy department. Secretary Long has been expecting the president would await the receipt of the brief which Rear Admiral Schley's counsel is preparing. Rear Admiral Schley has gone South, believing that the president will do nothing in his case until the presentation of the document next Monday.

Navy officials express confidence that the president will uphold Secretary Long and the findings of the court, with the exception of those individually expressed by Admiral Dewey. If he fails to do this he will be accused of having given way to popular clamor, for before Mr. Long acted upon the findings of the court he submitted his endorsements to Mr. Roosevelt, who approved it.

If the president acts adversely to Schley before the rear admiral submits his appeal friends of the admiral will charge him with unwillingness to consider points which they think will vindicate their hero. This charge was made by them against Rear Admiral Benham and Ramsay.

Unmindful of any criticism that may be made, however, Mr. Roosevelt has made his investigation and he purposes to act conscientiously, believing that the country will accept his verdict as that of an honest and impartial man.
