In a wreck on the Arkansas and Choctaw railroad four miles west of Fort Jowson, I. T., a few days ago, four persons were injured. The train was a mixed train and the wreck was caused by the steam shovel in front of the caboose and passenger coach turning over.
A man named Maddox, who lived at Cherokee, Fannin Co., and who was in the cab of the steam shovel, sustained a broken shoulder and injuries in the back. Two unknown men in the caboose were hurt, but the extent of their injuries was not learned. Mrs. J. H. Doster, formerly of this county, who was in the passenger coach, was seriously injured in the spine.
