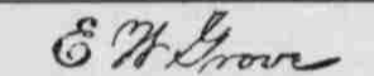

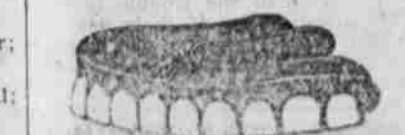

BANKRUPTCY NOTICE.

In the United States Court for the Southern District of the Indian Territory.

Hancock of Marlow, in the Southern District of the Indian Territory, in said district, respectfully represents that on the 19th day of February last past he was duly adjudged bankrupt under the acts of congress relating to bankruptcy; that he has duly surrendered all his property and rights of property and fully complied with all the requirements of said acts and of the orders of the court touching his bankruptcy.
