Indian Women Fight Duel.

Livingston, Mont., June 15.—For the love of a white man, a cowboy, two Crow Indian women have fought a duel to the death, knives being the weapons. Details of the battle, which took place thirty miles out on the reservation, have just reached here, and from all accounts it was one of the most furious combats that has ever taken place in Montana.

"Bob" Wilson, a tall, handsome young fellow, employed on the Double Bar X ranch, the other side of the reservation, is the man in the case. He had made love to both the women, it appears, and had promised to marry them. The two Indian women were cousins, and when they learned that Wilson was paying attention to both of them, there was trouble. Neither was willing to give up the man, and so it was agreed to settle the matter with knives in the presence of a large number of the tribe. A spot on Willow creek, which runs through the reservation, was chosen as the battle ground. Yesterday the women met there by agreement, each one accompanied by several of her friends.

Stripped to the waist, the combatants prepared for the fray. There was no referee, as all realized that it was a battle to the death. For nearly half an hour the fight went on, both women being slashed in a terrible manner.

Neither one would yield and their friends did not feel called on to interfere in the trouble. Finally both women dropped to the ground, exhausted, and when cared for it was found that both had received fatal wounds, from which they died a short time later.
