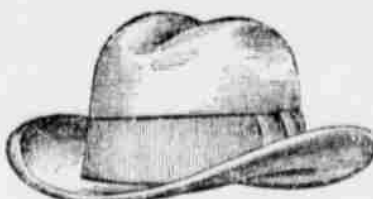

Ardmore, I. T., Nov. 21.—The following quotations show the market of today:

COTTON.

Ginners' Report Issued.

The first of a series of bulletins issued by the census ginners' bureau of the department of agriculture on cotton ginned up to Nov. 14, shows that 105 counties out of 812 to report, have ginned 1,244,741 bales against 783,344 last year for the same group of counties, most of which are located in Georgia. The increase in the amount ginned is about 63 per cent over last year and indicates bumper crop for Georgia, about 1,600,000 bales. As a result of the bearish showing made by the report the cotton markets soon afterwards lost from 15 to 17 points.
