Women should lead a simpler life and go back to the habit of prayer, was the counsel that Dr. T. Bulkeley Hyslop gave the other day at the meeting of the British medical association at Leicester. He was in a very pessimistic mood, and saw for the race little less than annihilation preceded by fearful degeneracy, and he blamed woman for the whole chapter of catastrophes which he predicted. The natural sphere of woman, he declared, is domesticity, and she has forsaken it and entered into a field in which mental labor is required. In doing so she not only pushes aside the male worker, but she unites herself for the duty of maintaining the race. He said that owing to the competition with women, men are obliged to emigrate, and that when a man could earn enough to support a woman he generally was willing to marry. The fearful result of this mental labor, in which women are indulging he thought responsible for the fact that of the 177,000 insane people in England 93,000 are women. Dr. Hyslop didn't see a ray of hope for woman and the race dependent upon her, unless the present order of things change and she leaves her strenuous life for the simple state for which he thinks she was created.

It is interesting to note that Dr. Hyslop was not supported by his brother physicians in his pessimistic doctrine, his theories being attacked upon several points. The physician at the head of the Essex insane asylum said that the trades unions had brought more people to the insane asylums than any other agency, and surely women are not, directly at least, responsible for them.
