CITY COUNCIL MEETING

INTERESTING MEETING—MUCH BUSINESS DONE.

Reports of Committees Read and Passed on—Leave of Absence Granted the City Clerk—Meeting Hour is Changed to Afternoon.

The city council met last night in regular session with Mayor Dick presiding and Aldermen Pennington, Carter, Best, Berryhill, Stuart, Shelton, Randol and Cruce present.

After the reading of the minutes of the preceding regular and call meetings, they were adopted.

The finance committee allowed and ordered warrants to be issued for the usual bills, which are necessary for the maintaining of the city's government.

Alderman Pennington, for the finance committee, recommended that Dr. S. S. Carr, chairman of the board of health of the city, be issued a warrant for \$50 for his services to the city. The recommendation was put into a motion and passed. The chairman of that committee also presented the bill of City Physician Moffett for his services the past month. This bill was for \$252.50, for visiting the sick poor of the city. The chairman of the committee recommended that the bill be gone over by the city clerk, in the presence of Dr. Moffett, to ascertain if any visit had been made to persons able to pay a doctor fee, and if so, to take their names from the list, and that the visits be paid for at the rate of \$1.50 per visit instead of \$2 and \$2.50 as was charged. This recommendation was passed.

Chairman Best, for the police committee, called attention to the fact that a number of new buildings were being built in the city and that many of these were three stories high, and that in many instances fire escapes have not been built. The Chief of Police was given instruction to look into this matter and where the fire escape had not been built to see that it was done.

Chairman Shelton, for the fire committee, presented a contract which had been drawn up in reference to the purchase of a buggy for Chief Slaughter of the fire department. The contract called for a \$158 buggy to be paid for all cash or a half down and half in six months. Alderman Pennington objected to the contract saying that a better one could be secured. A contract was then agreed upon whereby the buggy was to be paid for on the 1st of February next. The buggy to be delivered to the city as soon as it can be made.

Alderman Shelton also recommended that the chief of the fire department be given permission to order one hundred caps for plugs, and other supplies which were needed from the Anderson Coupling Co., the bill to aggregate \$271.75. This permission was given.

Chairman of the waterworks committee stated that that committee was confronted with the proposition of laying the water mains in the different wards and recommended that the aldermen in each ward take up the matter and decide where the mains are to be laid in their wards. Mayor Dick stated that some concessions would have to be made by the residents of each ward, as the mains could not be laid on every street in each ward. This matter will be left to the discretion of the council.

Chairman Stuart of the ordinance committee presented an ordinance from the Ardmore Light and Power Co., asking for a franchise for the erection and maintaining of a street railway, for the city. The ordinance was passed to its second reading.

Chairman Randol of the sanitary committee stated that the water used at the Union depot was unhealthy and recommended that some action be taken on that subject. This matter will further be investigated by that committee. He also spoke of the bums who lay around the depot and the police were ordered to clear them away from there.

The report of the city officials as follows were read: Police Judge Galt, for the month of May, \$566.95; Tax Assessor and Collector Roberts, for the same month, from all sources \$1343.18; Street Commissioner Landrum, for the months of April and May, 109.50; City Clerk Bruce, for the month of May, \$495.62.

Alderman Pennington of the finance committee recommended that J. B. Smith be not made to pay the 25 per cent tax which he had been charged for not paying his tax on time. This recommendation was put as a motion and passed.

A two weeks leave of absence was given City Clerk G. H. Bruce, for a trip to Boston.

John Cordell, of the assessors office, was given the job of doing the abstract work on the assessors books,
