## POLITICIANS COME AND GO

PAST WEEK WAS PROLIFIC OF SEMI-OFFICIAL STATEMENTS.

### NOT STANDING AWFULLY PAT

Is What Beveridge Announces After a Visit to the Strenuous One at Oyster Bay—Hoped That Oyster Bay—Hoped Hearst and Bryan Will Make Up.

#### Special Correspondence.

Washington, D. C., June 24.—The past week has been prolific of semi-official statements. Beveridge has been to Oyster Bay, and presumably with authority announces that "we are not standing so awfully pat as some folks suppose. The statement is Beveridge writes for the "World" is not as specific as the curious desire, but it announces that "natural causes" should be reasonable and avoid producing pale, just because it is found necessary to revise some scandalously oppressive schemes. The whole significance of this semi-official statement is that revision is accepted at Oyster Bay as an inevitable issue.

Then comes Bourke Cockran home from Nebraska, where he has seen Mr. Bryan. He repeats what so many who have seen Mr. Bryan lately doubt to be true; that is, that he is in doubt as to whether he will be a candidate or not. He thinks it is too soon to decide. These two great orators, according to the newspapers, spent their time in talking about the platform.

Finally Norman E. Mack returns from abroad to report of fields and individuals beyond the pale of candidacy, and says that Richard Croker will return to the states, but only to vote. The hope expressed by Mr. Mack that Mr. Hearst and Mr. Bryan will, for the party good, make up their differences, has brought out the first explicit statement concerning the basis of the feud between these two gentlemen. None of Hearst's friends whom the New York newspapers sought would speak for publication, but it was learned that there is still a very pronounced ill-feeling against Mr. Bryan, and the reason is given thus:

Mr. Hearst, in 1896 and 1900, personally through his newspapers, supported Mr. Bryan for the presidency. In 1904 Mr. Bryan was not a candidate for the presidency, while Mr. Hearst was, and Mr. Hearst felt that he should have Mr. Bryan's support. Instead of requiring the political loyalty of Mr. Hearst, Mr. Bryan went upon the platform and seconded the nomination of former United States Senator Cockrell, of Missouri, who had no chance of being nominated. Some of the Hearst people who were seen declared that Mr. Hearst's friends would do everything possible to defeat Mr. Bryan for the nomination next year and that if they accomplished their purpose, Mr. Hearst would not run for president as the candidate of the National Independent League.

For significance is lent by these statements, which are admittedly inspired from Hearst sources, to Mr. Bryan's recent utterance concerning the Hearst Independent League, to the effect that "from a Socialist standpoint there will be reason enough for a third party; but that from a Democratic standpoint, a third party will be unnecessary."

Neither the broad and charitable statesmanship which enlightening travel is supposed to produce, nor the chastening effects of defeat and repudiation, are apparent in this disclosure, and thoughtful Democrats are justified in wondering whether the promising party outlook is to be clouded by a personal rivalry, petty enough to do credit to a town meeting and involving personal ambitions and no principles.

Some of the ignoble results of this quarrel between the candidates may be seen in the recent exposure of Mr. Bryan's undignified method of hanging around box offices and personally collecting and bestowing in a bag carried for that purpose the actual cash for his work as a lecturer, instead of having a clerk or secretary to do it.

While this and other small items of purely personal interest may be entertaining to groundlings and professors of deportment, they cannot contribute to a healthy public discussion about matters of principle.

## MARK TWAIN'S FREAK STUNT

LONDONERS SAW THE HUMORIST IN A BATH ROBE.

The American Walked Several Blocks Along the Street in a Robin Blue Costume and Slippers—Simply Emulating Diana

London, June 23.—Mark Twain has set a new pace for the humorist, and they are fairly gasping for breath at an exhibition of his oddities. It is all because he has added another "chapter" to his white suit fad. The latest effort is also a color scheme, the dainty blue predominating.

The foyer of the big Brown hotel was buzzing with the voices of busy humanity yesterday afternoon when suddenly appeared a form like an apparition. At first the astonished Londoners believed that perhaps they had quickly been transferred to the land of the occult. Then on closer view they saw a figure the extremes of which displayed a head of bushy white hair and three inches of bare legs. The form was clad in a Robin's egg blue bath robe and slippers. It was then that the beaming face of the American humorist was recognized.

The consternation Twain was causing did not appear to jar him a bit. Without waiting for the onlookers to recover their surprise, he walked rapidly to the main entrance, his secretary, Captain R. W. Ashcroft, following close behind. At a rapid pace the humorist went down Dover street, all traffic coming to a standstill. The thoroughfare was crowded with pedestrians and everybody stopped to view what was supposed to be a demented man. It soon developed, however, that Twain was simply going to take a bath. He entered a bath club a few squares away and was lost to view for the time being.

But the fun was to be resumed. His bath completed, he retraced his steps inside an hour in the same abbreviated costume, to the amusement of the people on the street, and to the consternation of the hotel keeper. Mark Twain's only observation was that this was his favorite method of taking a bath when at the seaside, that it was a common practice with him and he knew of no reason why the Britishers should stand idly by and view him as a freak when he was emulating the example of Diana.
