Washington, D. C., April 21 -- A ainstaking analysis of the testimony aken in the several hearings of the Brownsville affair and especially that by the committee on military affairs, was presented to the senate today by Senator Warner of Missouri

"I have no prejudice against negro soldiers," said Warner, "and I am feared the floods in Colorado river groes as soldiers because I believe that members of the Twenty-Sixth afantry at Brownsvile disgraced the inited States uniform and stained an onorable record of their race as sol-

"Lawlessness is not the distinguishing characteristic of any race or color. To have allowed these soidiers to remain In service with the would have been criminal.

"No community in which they might e stationed would be secure."

Mr. Warner declared that "While there was a special motive for the negroes to shoot up the town in that way," he insisted that there was an absence of such motive on the part of anyone else.

### RESENT DISPENSER'S THREAT

Claim to Be the Better Informed As to the Necessity for a Liquor Prescription-Will Act Thursday-May Ignore Matter.

Oklahoma City, April 21.-Okiahoma City physicians resent the threat made by the Rev J. J. Thompson, district dispensary supervisor, that he will cause the arrest of doctors who make a practice of writing prescriptions for liquor, indiscriminately. The position of the doctors is that they are better judges of when quor prescriptions should be writ

ten than the former minister. "It is probable that the Oklahoma County Medical society, at its meeting Thursday night, will discuss the prescription clause of the Billups bill." says Dr. W. T. Salmon, president of the association. "It is likely that we will decide to ignore the threat of the Rev. Mr. Thompson and write prescriptions when we feel that conditions warrant, or else we may adopt the policy agreed upon by the soclery in El Reno and decline to write

whiskey prescriptions at all." "There are few diagnoses requiring whiskey alone as a remedy, but when whiskey is the one thing needed by a patient, it is likely that the atunding physician will consider the welfare of his patient rather than be governed by the threat of probable prosecution at the hands of the dispensary authorities.

"There are, no doubt some doctors who write prescriptions promisequously and at a stipulated fee. These physiclans, though, are not of the class to which the great body of practioners belong. Such deportment is condemned by the medical societies and the guilty ones expelled. Fortunately,
