## INTERESTING NEWS, VIEWS AND GOSSIP FROM NEW YORK CITY

New York, Jan. 8.—Commander Robert E. Peary, the alleged discoverer of the top of the earth, is in our midst today and will be given a square meal by the automobile crowd at the Union Club. The gallant naval commander who carried the Stars and Stripes to the north pole (somehow, that doesn't sound quite original, but it is still good for tremendous applause when orated at a banquet) will be wine and dined and praised, and there will be no meddling Cook to spoil the dinner.

Many automobile advertising men will be present, and they should be able to get some valuable pointers from the gallant, etc. The truth is that "It pays to advertise" should appeal to Commander Peary, who has recently shown himself a past master of the art. In a single issue of a prominent magazine for this month appears seventeen advertisements, most of them full page, in which the discoverer lends his name to the booming of the products advertised. It is to be presumed that these testimonials were voluntarily written by Mr. Peary, without hope of reward, but there are some who doubt it.

First on the list of Peary products is an encyclopedia and atlas, which he has "found invaluable in my explorations." Next comes a flat globe of the world, personally edited by Mr. Peary, which he modestly alleges is "the most accurate and up to date system of geographical reference in existence." A certain variety of bottle he found to be of "great utility" and hastens to spread its praises to a waiting world.

Nor are we left in ignorance as to the kind of razor the brave explorer used in shaving himself "with much satisfaction on board the good ship Roosevelt." We are distinctly informed, in double-page advertisement as to the make of camera used by Peary in the north. We know the kind of pencils he used in writing his record, although the signature to this testimonial appears to have been written with pen and ink. Another communication, now made public, tells how he investigated the merits of various kinds of aluminum cooking utensils, finally deciding upon a certain brand as the best.

After reading another published testimonial, we know what kind of rifle and cartridges should be used in polar expeditions. On the next page Peary is quoted as praising a certain New York department store, where one may "equip himself for an arctic trip." The sledge that carried Peary to the pole prints the testimony of the explorer.

We know the brand of tobacco which "assisted materially in passing many an hour of the long, dark winter night." The "ideal disinfectant and deodorant" had to be satisfied with a testimonial from the captain of the Roosevelt, his chief apparently suffering from writer's cramp. Mr. Peary knew he would have to have a

shaving brush that would last, and so he selected a certain superior kind, and testifies to its merits. Another letter praises the merits of a certain kind of powder-gun, not face.

From the advertising column we learn Peary's preference in breakfast foods, and—sash—the kind of underwear he wore. And the kind of watches carried by Peary and his comrades is by no means a secret.

The public is left in doubt as regards but a very few things. We do not know the variety of gumdrops he used, the whiskey he drank, or the soap wherewith he washed himself, if at all. Mayhaps this information will come out in due time.

Mrs. G. H. P. Belmont has engaged a suite at the Ten Eyck, Albany, from next Saturday and intends to spend a month in the capital city carrying on a suffrage campaign among legislators and prominent politicians. She will make this a social campaign and is arranging to give a series of receptions and teas for the "votes for women" propaganda.

A convention of the Laymen's Missionary Movement is to be held in this city next week. It is in connection with a world-wide movement which will culminate in May in Chicago. It is unconnected with any church, and is in the hands of laymen. Its avowed object is the Christianizing of the entire world within the present generation.

A sum of \$30,000,000 has been asked for, and every Christian country has assumed a part of this burden. It seeks to aid both native and foreign missions, and to work through existing missionary agencies. It has not created any new organization and neither collects nor administers funds but it endeavors to arouse members of the different churches to support the missions already sent out by their own bodies.

The idea behind the movement is that the history of the world is moving in such a way as to open the door to missions, and that if the opportunity is not seized at once no such favorable opening may again be offered.

Statistics compiled from the New York Social Register for 1910 show that the social center of the city remains this year, as last, in the neighborhood of Sixty-second street and Madison avenue. This indicates a pause in the uptown movement of the prominent families, for ever since 1890, when the center was found to be at Thirty-ninth street and Fifth avenue, it has been advancing northward at the rate of one, and sometimes two blocks a year. In December, 1905 it was at Fifty-eighth street, and it was thought the wide stretch of Central Park would have an effect in preventing it from going further uptown, but it jumped in 1898 to Sixty-second street, and this year's figures show it to be stationary for the first time in twenty years.

When the new Globe Theatre at Broadway and Forty-second street opens Monday, under the management of Charles R. Dillingham, the theatre-going public will see a house with several novel ideas. The principal one is the contrivance by which the theatre may be made principally an open-air place of amusement when desired.

There is a large oval panel in the ceiling which can be thrown open so that the audience may see the sky above. This permits the extension of the season into the summer months. Another feature is the accommodations provided for the actors. All dressing rooms are exceptionally large, and a number of them are provided with shower baths.

The opening attraction will be Montgomery and Stone in "The Old Homestead," by George Ade and Gustav Laders.
