HULL ARRAIGNED VAUGHN MURDER

PROSECUTOR REIGER MAKING A HARD FIGHT TO PREVENT BAIL BEING ALLOWED HIM.

CONTINUED TILL AFTERNOON

Reiger Resisting All Efforts to Make Bail Fixed and Demands That He Be Committed to Jail and Applications for Bail Denied.

Kirkville, Mo., Feb. 25.—Dr. James R. Hull of Monroe City, who was re-arrested Saturday on a second warrant, charging him with the murder of Professor Vaughn, was arraigned before Judge Shotton this morning and after a brisk legal battle, in which Prosecutor Reiger resisted all his efforts to have bail fixed, the hearing adjourned until this afternoon. charge and all applications for bail be denied. As a compromise this afternoon was set for a further examination of the evidence. Friends of Hull are hopeful that he will be allowed to make bond, as Mrs. Vaughn, wife of the dead man, arrested on a similar charge, was admitted to bail in the sum of \$25,000. W. A. Sullivan and J. E. Sinton of Monroe City, who were on Hull's first bond, accompanied him here and say they are prepared to put up \$100,000 cash bond for Hull.

Facing 42 Indictments.

Shannon, Okla., Feb. 27.—Party-two indictments charging violations of the prohibition law have been returned by the district court against J. W. Henderson, who is now in jail. His bond was fixed at \$1,200 in each case but he has been unable to execute it for that amount.

Eighty indictments in all have been returned by the grand jury. The only case adjourned until Tuesday that the county attorney may draw up all the indictments. It may adjourn Tuesday.

HUNDREDS DEAD IN A LANDSLIDE

TWELVE BODIES ALREADY RECOVERED BY THE HUNDREDS OF RESCUERS NOW WORKING.

ACCIDENT AN UNUSUAL ONE

Slide One Mile Long and Thirty Feet Deep Occurred on Mountain Side Near Walla Walla, Washington—Many Buildings Swept Away.

Walla Walla, Wash., Feb. 28.—Five hundred rescuers have taken out twelve dead bodies, while twenty-five men, women and children have been taken alive from the slide that occurred at Mace last night. It is known that one hundred additional are dead. The slide is one mile long and thirty feet deep.

With scarcely a dividing line perceptible, the towns of Black Bear, Mace and Burke form a long string of houses for six miles. Mace has a population of 100, all with few exceptions, storekeepers and school teachers in the employe of the mine.

Three box cars, containing fifty section men in the employe of the Northern Pacific railroad, were standing on a side track, when the slide occurred. All of these men are supposed to have lost their lives. Fifteen houses have been swept away, according to the latest information.

Another Slide Today.

Spokane, Wash., Feb. 28.—Early this morning another slide rushed down on the town of Burke, crushing scores of houses under thousands of tons of earth and snow.

Sixteen dead have been found at Burke. How many are still buried can only be guessed.

Thirty-five Italians, sleeping in an outfit car, were swept away. They used their tools to dig themselves out. All but one of these have been accounted for.

SENATE PASSES THE WHITE SLAVE BILL

OKLAHOMA SENATE ADOPTS HOUSE BILL PROVIDING PENALTY FOR "WHITE SLAVER."

Guthrie, Okla., Feb. 28.—The senate today passed the house "white slave" bill, providing for a penalty of twenty years' imprisonment for any person guilty of pandering, procuring or in any way engaging in the "white slave" traffic.

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 28.—Rufus J. Lackland, president of the Boatmen Bank, died here today of pneumonia. He was 90 years of age. He was one of the best known bankers in Missouri.

PRESSMEN VOTING TODAY.

In Election For International Officers—May Re-elect Berry.

Chicago, Feb. 28.—Members of the locals of the Pressmen's Union throughout the country are voting today in an election for international officers. President George L. Berry is opposed by former President Martin L. Higgins and by Michael Rother of St. Paul. It is likely that President Berry will be re-elected, as under his administration harmony in the ranks of the pressmen has been restored and the organization is stronger than ever before.

Peter Dodds of New York is opposed for vice president by Frank R. Wilke of Milwaukee, formerly a vice president and organizer. Michael Flannery of Chicago will have John Mines of New York against him in the contest for second vice president, and Clayton A. Pease of Chicago will have A. B. Kreidler as an opponent. Secretary Patrick McMullen of Cincinnati will have to get more votes than C. B. Crowley if he is returned to his present office.

OCEAN BALLOON TRIP.

Crossing a Landing Place—is Confident of Success.

New York, Feb. 27.—If Carl Leps of Hamburg can find a proper place in the neighborhood of a balloon landing he intends to sail in a big dirigible from Germany in April.

With eight motors generating 1,000 horsepower, he will make the trip in three days, he says. He plans to have nine passengers with him, although the dirigible would easily carry ten times as many.

Leps did not bring the dirigible with him. He merely came to select a landing place and will return to Germany shortly. He declares that the dirigible will in a short time take the place of all trans-Atlantic steamships as passenger carriers and he thinks that the big liners may be kept on duty for the purpose of transporting freight.

INDIANS WIRE SENATOR OWEN.

Geronimo's Band Have Confidence in Owen—Urge Passage of Bill.

Fort Sill, Okla., Feb. 27.—Fourteen of the leading Apache Indians, held on the military reservation here as remnant of Geronimo's band, tonight wired Senator Robt. L. Owen at Washington, approving the senate bill providing for tribesmen's freedom and allotment and urging its passage. Senator Owen, himself an Indian, is championing the cause of the Apaches. With Geronimo dead, Indians believe the bill will pass.

If liberated they will be given allotments north and east of the military reservation.
