THERE were fifteen homicides in the Hills during the past year and only one conviction for murder.

A. J. CLARK has sold his newspaper outfit for a newspaper at Wadena and has retired on the glory won.

DR. C. W. MYER will spend the winter in Washington laboring for the creation of the territory of Lincoln.

As the paper on which this is printed did not arrive until this (Monday) evening, THE TRIBUNE considers it sufficient excuse for being late this week.

STAGE robberies have become so frequent on the southern routes to the Black Hills that they have ceased to attract attention. Another heavy one last week is reported.

The small pox scare at Grand Forks is ended. The scare was a bad one—the disease did not prevail to any alarming extent except in the minds of the people of neighboring towns.

ELSEWHERE IN THE TRIBUNE will be found the President's annual message, the report of the Secretary of the Treasury, also of the Secretary of the Navy and the third auditor of the Treasury. The reader can draw his own conclusions.

The mule whacker who runs the Jamestown Alert takes exceptions to THE TRIBUNE'S playful allusions to his capacity for blundering and frantically calls whoa! He promises cheerful obedience, however, in future so THE TRIBUNE kindly consents.

THEY had to import material to start a grave yard at Fargo—*Collinette (Ill.) Democrat.*

Certainly: In Fargo, where, by the way, some of the notes of the Independent man were taken, and his paper sold out for non payment. Ask us a hard one.

It is now believed that Blaine was afraid God would hear and answer the prayer of the Chaplain of the house and senate for peace and harmony between the North and the South, and so undertook to take advantage of the situation by stirring up the animals at once.
