WORDS FROM WAXAHATCHIE.

The Parker Amusement Company is Highly Endorsed.

Waxahatchie (Texas) Light.

The largest crowd yet attending the carnival thronged the streets and the public square last night and crowded the many attractions of the New Parker Amusement company, all joining in one grand night of revelry, and enjoying the beauties of scenic productions, the delights of harmonious strains, the gaiety of a brilliant scene and the pleasure of entertaining devices that are provided by the Retail Merchants' Association for this annual occasion.

The nature of the Carnival attractions now here is better understood than when the carnival first arrived. It has been demonstrated that the New Parker company is not a cheap combination of rough and rowdy attractions, but is a well organized well constructed amusement company, presenting only those productions that are proper for ladies and children, and the best people of the city have joined in the pleasures of carnival week, that they may see and enjoy. A number of social parties were out, young men with favored maidens, older ones with their wives, and matrons with life partners, gathered in congenial numbers and made the round of the various attractions, being enraptured by the scenic beauties.

The animal circus is drawing big crowds. There are 125 trained wild and domestic animals in this attraction, and the intelligence that is shown by each individual beast approaches almost the possibilities of the human mind. The ponies, the dogs and the bears please the women and the children immensely. They are thrilled by the contest in the lions den, and are delighted with the great sensational act, Nero, the riding lion that comes into the caged arena and leaps upon a galloping horse.

There is a standing offer of a forfeit to the owner of any horse that cannot be ridden by one of the cowboy connected with the band, headed by Arizona Harry and Lon Seely. Yesterday afternoon an untamable mule of the "Her Name Was Maud" variety was brought to the arena, the announcement being made that the animal belonged to Orrin Gahagen of this city and had never been ridden. One of the cowboys attempted to ride the animal, and at an unguarded moment the beast tossed him high in the air, unseating him with ease. There was an immediate conference of the cowboys, and Arizona Harry announced that he would guarantee to ride the mule at the night performance or he would give the owner \$50. Last night there was a large audience to watch the contest. The animal that is without pride of ancestry or hope of posterity, but occupying an exalted position as a buckler, was led into the arena. It was with difficulty that he was saddled and bridled, and putting his foot in the stirrup, Arizona Harry threw his other leg across the animal, and said "let go." The attendants at the affair "let go" and with a bray that could be heard for blocks, his Muleship, humped his back, put all four feet together in the center, and tossed. But Harry did not leave his seat. Back as he would, the rider was there, and around and around the arena the animal moved, trying in every way to unseat the rider, but to no effect. It was a great riding exhibition.
