

FRISCO DIVISIONS ARE REORGANIZED

Superintendents' Offices Are Abolished in Red River and Ozark Districts.

ADD TERRITORY TO OTHERS

Two Hundred Miles More of Track Under Jurisdiction of Sapulpa Official.

Reports from St. Louis reached Tulsa yesterday that a general reorganization of the territory of division superintendents on the Frisco railroad is to become effective on April 1.

The offices of two superintendents are to be abolished, that of T. B. Cappage, superintendent of the Red River division, with headquarters at Madill, Okla., and that of J. G. Taylor, acting superintendent of the Ozark division with headquarters at Springfield, Mo.

Mr. Cappage, who is one of the oldest division superintendents on the system, will be assigned to other duties.

It is reported that Mr. Taylor will go to Enid, Okla., to relieve Division Superintendent S. L. Major, who will become superintendent of terminals at Memphis, Tenn.

That part of the Red River division between Sapulpa and Sherman, including 208 miles of track, is to be added to the territory of Division Superintendent L. H. Bassett at Sapulpa. The line from Ardmore, Okla., to Hope, Ark., will be given to Division Superintendent C. H. Baltzell at Fort Smith, Ark.

The Ozark division, between Springfield and Thayer, Mo., will be added to the territory of Division Superintendent J. W. Wood at Memphis, Tenn., and the "High Line" between Springfield and Kansas City will be assigned to Division Superintendent J. F. Slimm at Springfield, Mo.

These changes were made after a recent trip of inspection over the line by Federal Manager Pyeatt of St. Louis.

SEALED VERDICT IN SUIT THREE TIMES BEFORE JURY


COURT ORDER GIVES MRS. FRIEDMAN SAFETY

A sealed verdict was returned by a jury in the district court yesterday in the suit of Mrs. B. C. Courtney against J. J. Myers, in which the plaintiff asked damages of \$25,000 for the loss of one leg and other permanent injuries as the result of a fall from a box car on April 2, 1911, alleged to have been due to the negligence of the defendant. The verdict will be read by Judge Edmund B. Cole in district court Saturday morning.

Courthers, while employed as a brakeman for the Frisco railroad, was thrown from a box car near the intersection of the railroad tracks and Franklin Avenue. He claimed the accident was due to the plaintiff's bracing a smoke stack of a planing mill operated by Myers, which had been allowed to become too low over the railroad track.

The defense declared the guy wire was well above the track and that Courthers either fell from the car or was blown off by the wind. The case has been tried before by three previous juries, but in none of the trials was a verdict returned.

AD WRITING COURSE ON PRACTICAL LINES

Experts Will Direct Students How to Prepare Effective Copy in Publicity Work.

In the Y. M. C. A. advertising course beginning April 1, students will be taught, not so much the theory, but the actual practice of advertising. Each member of the class, on completing the course, may be able to write advertisements that will bring results.

During the course each member of the class will be required to prepare work to be criticized constructively. The methods of instruction will include lectures, discussions and home work. The first 45 minutes of each class period will be devoted to a lecture.

The outline for the first four lessons will be published in The Tulsa Evening World and the outline for the second four lessons as given by C. K. Leslie are as follows:

The fifth lesson will be introduced by a lecture on "How to Lay Out an Ad and the Use of Illustrations" by Emil Salomon. The lecture will include suggestions for determining the size of an ad and the four principles of display.

The sixth lesson will be introduced by F. O. Larson by a lecture, "Knowledge of Paper, Type, Ink, Colors, Printing Process, Etc." Mr. Larson is business manager of The Tulsa World.

The seventh lesson will be introduced by Lee Levering on the subject "Retail Store Advertising," and will include how and when to advertise a retail business and the value of special sales and bargain displays.

The eighth lesson will be introduced by A. H. Waitz on "Newspaper Advertising," which will include why the newspapers are more popular than other publications and the size and space to use and how often.

RITZERT ESTATE MUST MAKE FAMILY ALLOWANCE

Allowing the widow of Frank J. Ritzert, deceased, a reasonable allowance for her support and the support of her children for a period of at least one year, an order was made in the county court refusing the claim made by the widow through the executor of the estate, S. L. Cronin, was reversed by Judge Owen Owen in district court Friday and remanded to the county court with instructions to make such an allowance.

The executor of the estate filed a petition with the district court Wednesday, stating that the county court had refused to make the allowance on the grounds that since the estate was insolvent, there were no funds available for the support of the widow and children. The ruling was taken to the district court on appeal and a reversal obtained from Judge Owen.

Declaring she has fears for her personal safety, a restraining order was asked in superior court Friday by the plaintiff in the divorce proceedings of Laura M. Friedman against Charles J. Friedman, enjoining her husband from in any way interfering with the plaintiff in her possession of the home, 1307 South Boston avenue, or the possession of the minor child.

Mrs. Friedman also asks an order compelling her husband to pay her temporary alimony of \$100 a month and attorney fees of \$100.
