

NATIONAL LYNCHING CONFERENCE CALLED

Meeting Will Be Held in New York May 5 and 6 to Devise Means to Combat Lawlessness.

SPONSORED BY OFFICIALS

Attorney General Palmer and Several Governors Sign Petition for Session Next Month.

NEW YORK, April 17.—A call for a national conference on lynching to be held here May 5 and 6 to take concerted action against lynching and lawlessness wherever found, was issued today by John R. Shillady, acting on behalf of the group of 120 well known men and women of the country who have signed the document. The signers represented the district of Columbia and 28 states, including 20 signers from eight southern states.

The general committee, headed by the attorney general, states that 2,216 lynchings, exclusive of the East, South and other mob law, have occurred in the United States in the last 10 years. Of this number 2,054 were negroes. During 1918 there were 63 negroes and four white prisoners lynched, according to the committee, which adds that since the recent lynchings have been particularly atrocious, involving burning at the stake and torture of the victims.

Among the signers are: Attorney General A. Mitchell Palmer and former Attorney Generals Charles J. Bonaparte and Judson Harmon; five governors, Hugh M. Dorsey of Georgia, F. W. Davis of Idaho, James Goodrich of Indiana, Henry J. Allen of Kansas and Emerson C. Harrington of Maryland; Elihu Root, Charles R. Hughes, Cardinal Gibbons, senators Arthur Capper of Kansas and Medley McCormick of Illinois and Dr. Anna Howard Shaw.

WAILEY SETS RECORD FOR CONTINENTAL FLIGHT

AMERINUS, Ga., April 17.—A new record for a transcontinental flight was established today by W. J. MacAuley, who completed the last leg of a trip from San Diego, Cal., to Jacksonville, Fla., by flying from Jacksonville to Jacksonville. Humane Society Is Guardian of Thousands of Tulsa Boys

The boy problem has grown to be a serious one of some magnitude in Tulsa as is shown in the report of the humane society for a period covering the past 11 months. There have been 2,018 juvenile cases, besides 1,147 personal interviews with boys.

The humane society is called upon to handle every kind of a situation. It is said that people in trouble of any sort, knowing no other place to seek succor of their ills, bring them to Humane Agent A. M. Welch. He states that in his opinion none of the work is more important than that of the boys who have started on the wrong path. According to him it takes little, in many cases, to set them straight again.

Only last Saturday week officers brought 17 boys before Mr. Welch for pilfering and other misdemeanors. They were paroled after being given a lecture and advice on the following Saturday 12 of them returned with signed statements from their teachers that they had attended school every day and had done creditable work. "Such a reward," stated Mr. Welch, "makes the work worth while."

On Saturday of this week 75 captains with the assistance of from three to five women each, will set tags on the streets of the city to raise funds for the benefit of the humane society, which association is also at the back of the social service and welfare work of children's detention home, and Epizeell (negro) hospital.

SALE OF WAR-BUILT FLEET IS STARTED IN NEW YORK

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Sale of the war-built merchant fleet was begun today by the shipping board with the transfer of 15 wooden steamships to Nacirema Steamship company, New York, at a price of \$650,000 for each vessel. This is an average of \$145 per deadweight ton.

The fleet is to be operated by the Brooks Steamship company of New York in the trans-Atlantic trade. Five of the 15 will be operated out of New York, five out of Havana, five out of New Orleans. Deliveries will be completed within a short time.

Contracts for all 15 vessels have been booked in advance and as a result the purchasers have opened negotiations for the purchase of 15 more vessels of the same type and for immediate delivery. They also propose to take over a third fleet of the same size in the future. It is understood that the purchasers obtained insurance ranging from 1 1/2 to 3 1/2 per cent, which shipping experts said indicated the underwriters now regarded this type of vessel as a good risk. The original insurance rate ranged from 5 to 7 per cent.

TEN-WEEK BUILDING CAMPAIGN IS PLAN

Chamber of Commerce to Consider Putting Tulsa Into Nation-Wide Construction Movement.

Tulsa will have a 10 weeks' home building campaign all its own, if the plans of Secretary Douglas of the chamber of commerce are adopted. At the noonday meeting and luncheon of the directors of the chamber today at the Hotel Tulsa, Colonel Douglas will put the proposition before the house.

An executive committee to direct the work would be appointed by the directors under the Douglas plan. Other committees deemed necessary would be appointed to push the campaign from every angle.

"Without a doubt," said the colonel Thursday, "the opportunity is now at hand for Tulsa to go into this proposition with its usual vim and bring thousands in population to the city. The United States department of labor is asking for support in a national campaign for the entire nation and I don't think Tulsa has yet allowed opportunity to know unheeded. This is one of the most important issues that has ever arisen here."

Apparently a campaign of this nature would receive unlimited support. This is indicated by the records of the city building inspectors' office, which show new homes are being erected in Tulsa at an amazing rate. Nevertheless real estate men are unable to supply the demand, for most of the homes now under construction are being built by those who will occupy them.

Declare Marine Dividend

NEW YORK, April 17.—The board of directors of the International Mercantile Marine company at a meeting today declared a dividend of 10 per cent out of the net profits of the company on account of unpaid back dividends accruing upon the preferred stock. The dividend is payable May 15 to stockholders of record at the close of business on May 1.

MEXICAN PROPERTIES GO BACK TO RIGHTFUL OWNERS

EL PASO, Texas, April 17.—Four hundred mining properties in the state of Chihuahua, Mexico, which were confiscated during the revolution, will be returned to the owners at once, it was announced here today. Exceptions were made in the cases of Gen. Luis Terrazas, General Huerta's estate and that of Gen. Pascual Orozco. These properties will not be returned. A majority of the mining properties were confiscated by the constitutional government.

BONDS STOLEN FROM BANK IN MISSOURI ARE RECOVERED

KANSAS CITY, April 17.—Liberty bonds and valuable commercial papers stolen from safety deposit boxes of the Bank of Cleveland, at Cleveland, Mo., by robbers who chiseled through the door of the vault early today, were found by authorities in a pond near here this afternoon.

Officials of the bank said that the value of the Liberty bonds taken amounted to \$20,000 and that they were all registered bonds. Whether the lost dumped into the pond is the entire amount lost by the bank has not been ascertained. Several safety deposit boxes taken from the bank were found in the pond.
