

KENDALL PLANS TWO MILLION ENDOWMENT

If Present Program Succeeds Tulsa Institution Will Rank Among Leading Schools of Country.

IMPROVEMENTS TO COME

Survey Is Now Being Made for a \$100,000 Gymnasium, Which Will Be Ready This Fall.

A survey is being made presenting the erection of the Kendall college campus of a \$100,000 gymnasium this summer, occupancy of which is to be had early in the fall or not later than the first of September.

It is stated by C. H. Kendlough, registrar of the college, that this is expected to be the finest gymnasium building in the state and will be the greatest single improvement made at Kendall this year.

Next projects are planned for the new future, however, an accounting to the registrar, an endowment fund probably to the extent of \$250,000 will be sought. This will enable the school to build and equip itself to compete with any college in the country as an institution of learning.

A dinner was given recently at the Country club by E. R. Kemp and E. H. Harnett, members of the board of trustees, when some 50 or 60 men who are interested in the welfare of Kendall college were in attendance and at this time assumed responsibility of understanding the deficit that falls upon the college each year until such time as an endowment fund can be raised to make it unnecessary.

It is stated that such a plan gives the college a safe and secure backing and enables her to go ahead with improvements and advanced methods without any embarrassment financially. The endowment fund is expected to be secured within three years.

PHONE LINE TO HAITI AND GREATER ANTILLES

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, May 22 (By mail).—Direct telephone service between Key West and Havana will be ready by December, according to Col. Sosthenes Behn, who announces that the submarine telephone cable connecting the mainland and Cuba which was planned before the war will be laid within the next few months.

At present the most prominent American and English engineers are working on the scheme, according to Colonel Behn and the laying of the cable will be commenced this summer.

The submarine telephone from Cuba to Key West according to Colonel Behn is but the first leg of a cable telephone system which in time will connect all of Greater Antilles.

The development of the telephone during the war has made it possible for us to plan now for a submarine telephone cable system which three years ago was not dreamed of, said Colonel Behn. The first leg of the system from Key West to Havana in itself will be the longest submarine telephone in the world. At present the submarine telephone across the English channel is the longest.

Mr. Behn, president of the Cuban Telephone company when the United States entered the war. He volunteered and was commissioned a captain in the army signal corps. He is connected with banking interests in Cuba.

A P. OFF AFTER THE WAR

The bacon is sold by the German cash and carry system, which has been in use since the food shortage became imminent throughout the country.

Cleveland Jews Protest. (Cleveland, June 2.) With muffled drums and with every man wearing black bands or mourning garments, approximately 50,000 Jews paraded through the downtown section of the city today in protest in the reported anti-Jewish persecution in Poland and Galicia. Many stores and factories closed during the afternoon, the Jewish working people observing a half holiday of mourning.




