KILL TWO INJURE MANY IN TOLEDO RIOTS

TO CALL WATER ELECTION SOON

Commissioners Direct City Attorney to Prepare Resolution Calling for Vote.

BUSINESS MEN URGE ACTION

Prominent Tulsans Urge Officials to Put Question Up to Taxpayers.

PRESSEY REPORT ADOPTED

Curran Is Only Member of Board Who Expressed Dissatisfaction.

At an adjourned meeting of the board of city commissioners last Tuesday afternoon at 10 o'clock, P. M. Marshall, city attorney, was instructed to prepare an ordinance and resolution for adoption which would call for a general election of the city on the Spavinaw water project.

These papers will be presented to the commission for final action at the meeting Monday morning, at which time it is probable the election will be called.

On June 3, the water question will go to a vote about July 1. The main contention of the city attorney is that the city should not be bound by the Spavinaw water project.

Curran, the only member of the board who expressed dissatisfaction, said that he was not in favor of the water project.

Curran then took the floor and in a long speech urged the commission to withhold its vote on the water project.

BURLESON DECLARES STRIKE NOT PERMISSIBLE. ATLANTA, Ga., June 3.—Warning the striking employees of the Southern Bell and Atlanta Telephone companies that strikes are not permissible in the government service.

CAPTURE OF PIETROGRAD BY FINNS REPORTED. COPENHAGEN, June 3.—Echo-lan and Finnish forces have taken Pietrograd, according to an unconfirmed telegram from Vardoe received by the National Tidende.

SWEDEN AND DENMARK REFUSE GERMAN BLOCKADE. ST. CROIX, June 3.—Sweden and Denmark have notified the peace conference that they will not join in a blockade of Germany in the event of a German refusal to sign the peace treaty.

COUNTER-REVOLUTIONS REPORTED IN HUNGARY. BERLIN, via London, June 3.—Counter-revolutionary uprisings have occurred in many towns and villages of western Hungary, according to reports received here.

VANCOUVER LABOR WALKS OUT IN GENERAL STRIKE. VANCOUVER, B. C., June 3.—Westward flow of strikes which have been sweeping across the dominion with Winnipeg as the starting point, reached the fiftieth at Vancouver today.

AWARDED WAR CROSS. WASHINGTON, June 3.—Five pharmacists of the navy, who served with the marine brigade in the second division during fighting last year, have been awarded the war cross.

REMER GOES TO PARIS. BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS. WASHINGTON, June 3.—Ernest Remer, head of the American peace mission, accompanied by three of the leading members of the mission and two secretaries carrying 50 copies of the allied peace treaty in German, French and Italian, left St. Germain for Paris at 8 o'clock this evening.

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Palmer Says Attacks Fail; Hunt Starts for the Anarchists.

OUTRAGE CONCERNED Officials Think Terrorism All Comes From One Source.

SEVERAL ARRESTS ARE MADE

PITTSBURGH, June 3.—Arrest of the man who manufactured the bombs which exploded last night near the house of Federal Judge W. H. Thompson and W. W. Murray, chief of the bureau of investigation is expected soon by authorities, who are investigating the outrages.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Investigation of the bomb explosions in eight cities, which were intended to kill public men, has convinced secret service chiefs that the outrages had a common source.

DETROIT, June 3.—Police at New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Cleveland, New York, Mass., Boston and Paterson, N. J., were engaged in the widespread hunt for the man who was killed last night at the door of Attorney General Palmer's home.

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GERMAN TERMS TO BE MODIFIED

Allies Considering Concessions on Reparations and Territorial Conditions.

FULL AGREEMENT LACKING

English Favor Several Alterations While French Are Standing Firm.

AMERICA SUPPORTS CHANGE

Do Not Go as Far as British in View; Answer Is Expected in 48 Hours.

PARIS, June 3.—Two changes in the German peace terms, one territorial and the other financial, are being considered by the council of four, it became known today. The financial question is the possibility of the acceptance of the German proposal to pay an indemnity of 100,000,000,000 marks, which would involve liquidation of the allied financial commission to which the Germans strongly object.

PARIS, June 3.—Experts of the United States, France, Great Britain and Italy, on the invitation of the American delegation, held a meeting today to discuss the German counter proposals. French experts also were in session.

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Three Outbreaks Result in Willys-Overland Walkout

Two FATALLY INJURED In Second Battle at Plant Soldiers Fire and Disperse Crowd.

FIGHT RESUMED AT NIGHT

Two More Receive Dangerous Wounds When Troops Open Fire.

TOLEDO, Ohio, June 3.—Two men were shot to death and two others were dangerously wounded in a riot late tonight growing out of the labor disturbances involving 13,000 employees of the Willys-Overland automobile company.

The victims, presumably idle employees of the company, were killed by discharged soldiers who are guarding the plant. The killing was the culmination of three riots today and tonight which resulted in injury to 30 persons. The killing occurred in front of a fire station near the automobile plant where a discharged soldier guard with a woman companion had sought refuge from a threatening crowd.

Final Vote Expected, With Adoption of Amendment Regarded Certain.

THREE SENATORS IN ATTACK

Read, Underwood and Borah Denounce It; Harrison Proposal Beaten.

ARE COMPARED TO BOMBERS

Missourian Sees Same Mental Attitude of Militants as of Anarchists.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Final action in the senate on the woman suffrage constitutional amendment was prevented today by debate, principally by suffrage opponents, and by discussion of the peace treaty. The resolution was made unfinished business, and it is believed that before adjournment tomorrow the last roll call will be reached, with adoption apparently assured.

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
