

MORE THAN THOUSAND FOR SUMMER SCHOOL

Hundreds of Tulsa Students Enroll for Classes During Vacation—To Last Ten Weeks.

NO AFTERNOON SESSIONS

Physical Training and Playground Work Will Be Stressed—Schedule Begins June 16.

A summer school will open Monday, June 16, and be conducted under the auspices of the city schools. The high school will have an enrollment of one week with three one-month periods each day, and the grade schools will be divided into two terms of five weeks each. The first beginning June 16 and ending June 18, the second term beginning July 21 and ending August 2. All sessions will open at 8:30 a. m. in the morning and close at 12:30 p. m. Eleven hundred and eighty students have already enrolled for the grade schools.

It is noted that only those pupils who are permitted to attend who have been recommended by the principals and teachers of their respective schools and that pupils will be permitted to make up work in which they have failed in which they have been recommended. If new work is attempted it will be limited to two subjects and must be done with the consent of the principal.

Physical training and playground work are to be given special attention and swimming will be enjoyed at the high school. Miss La Rue Harn will have charge of this work at Central Union and Miss Louise Hanson will be at the high school in the mornings and Central park in the afternoon. Other teachers will be assigned for other schools.

All work given in the regular school term will be had in the grade summer school. The departments furnished in the summer school of the high school will be English, history, mathematics, Latin, French, commercial, domestic art and physical training.

CAPTAIN ASA ROGERS IS BACK FROM FRANCE

Although Still in Service at Washington He Probably Will Accept Place With Tulsa Oil Concern.

Capt. Asa L. Rogers, who has served 18 months overseas assigned to first section general staff, arrived in the city yesterday upon a short visit with his brother, Remington Rogers, 7th West beneath street.

At the outbreak of the war Mr. Rogers was an engineer for the Tulsa Oil company in Tulsa and having had previous experience with the Mobil Oil company he was able to equal it. For a brief period he was in the regular army and later was promoted to rank of captain.

During overseas on the last voyage from the Tulsa before he was destroyed by a German submarine, Captain Rogers arrived in France in December, 1917. While stationed with general headquarters first section general staff, Rogers saw service in France, Italy, England, Germany and Belgium.

Although Rogers, and although a commanding pleasant and interesting experience over there, I am not yet to stay on this side. Captain Rogers is still in the service as a member of the general staff at Washington. If at present he is considered as accepting a position with a local oil company, in which case he will apply for his discharge from the army and make his home in Tulsa.

The idea is according to J. S. Malone, county farm agent, to show the dairyman of the county that it is more profitable to keep fewer cows of better production qualities than the average cattle found in the county at the present time.
