

# Web of Interurban Traction Lines Woven About Tulsa's Trade Territory Is Promise

With the completion of good water for the future, public service corporations of Tulsa and vicinity and especially the street and interurban traction companies are planning to acquire their facilities for serving the public and various plans for projects embracing work of extension are already under consideration.

Already in the summer in circulation to the effect that a corporation is to be formed is considering the extension of an interurban line to Muskogee, the terminal to be located near the dam site. Such a line would, it is said, render a service profitable to the company throughout the entire year since travel is good at Muskogee in all seasons.

That especially would such a line prove profitable in the summer months is the opinion of business men of the city who are interested in the project. It is pointed out that thousands of Oklahomans would make the trip to Muskogee weekly for outdoor bathing trips. Although no estimate has yet made public its destination to build such a road the summer is persistent that the proposition is under consideration.

Street Railway to Espanola.

Perhaps the earliest program of extension to be inaugurated within the city is that of the Tulsa Street Railway. Although this extension has been greatly hindered in the past through legal procedure by the citizens who own property adjacent to the company's right of way, any further attempt of the corporation to extend its lines, it is predicted by Morris Mottram, manager, that all differences will be ironed out in the near future.

It is pointed out by McGeath that citizens have been exceptionally radical in their opposition to extension on North Cherokee. But it is believed that the company, to meet the increasing population of the city due to a better water supply in no far as the public will permit.

New Interurban Extensions.

Although the Oklahoma Union Railway company is best known for its interurban service it is possible too that this corporation will be able to increase its intercity facilities in proportion to the growth of the city. An extension of the interurban line from Kiefer to Okmulgee has been under consideration for some time but no definite action has been taken on this matter.

J. E. Crowe, active director of affairs of the company, is out of the city and in his absence Superintendent Miller would make no statement as to the intention of the company. He did, however, state that the company realizes that the city will undergo a substantial increase in population in the near future and that his corporation would undoubtedly take such steps as are deemed necessary to keep pace with the growth of the city.

All evidence then, backed up by the testimonials of various heads of industry and intercity railway men, indicate beyond a doubt that when spring water is turned on in the city mains there will be ample and abundant transportation facilities to care for the city, regardless of its growth in the interim.

And stop this evidence of contemplated extension in the transportation field comes the information that John Skuttel, president of the street railway company of Oklahoma City and prominent western Oklahoma interurban man, is planning more seriously than ever before the construction of the Tulsa-Oklahoma City interurban line. No information is available as to city extensions contemplated by the Sand Springs line.
