

### TROOPS SUBJECT TO U. S. ORDERS

Foch Nor Allied Powers Have No Control Over Our Army.

### WILSON TELLS STATUS

Writes Congress on Use of Remaining Forces in Germany; Allen Commands.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—President Wilson informed the house today in response to a resolution of inquiry that American troops on the Rhine will be controlled by the terms of the armistice and were subject only to his orders as commander-in-chief of the American army.

Field Marshal Foch of France, the president said, had no jurisdiction over the troops nor are they in any way controlled by the decisions of the allied Rhineland commission, which makes recommendations for the governing of the territory policed by the allied armies of occupation.

Major General Allen, commanding the American troops, the president wrote, "has full authority" to police the territory under his control, to preserve order, and to "repel any attack which may be made upon him."

The instructions proposed to be issued to the commanding general at the time of their occupying the Coblenz area were submitted to the war department by General Pershing and contained the statement of policy that the "Americans would undertake no action beyond the occupied regions nor beyond that in strict accordance with the terms of the treaty."

In regard to the Rhineland high commission, the policy stated that the United States did not admit the jurisdiction of that body over portions of the area occupied by the United States troops. General Allen was, however, instructed to maintain the "closest touch" with the commission and conform its conduct of the occupied region as nearly as possible to that over other occupied territory. He was also allowed to sit informally with the commission if requested to do so.

The president said the American forces in Germany on March 26 "were reported to comprise 724 officers and 16,735 enlisted men."

The American forces in Germany, the president wrote, "are at present operating under the terms of the original armistice and the subsequent convention prolonging the armistice."

### FIX PEACE COMMISSION

Will Gather at San Remo, Italy, April 10—Wants U. S. Represented at Conference.

PARIS, April 1.—The resumption of the sittings of the peace conference, which now seems definitely set for April 10 or 11, at San Remo, Italy, brings up the question of whether the United States will be represented, and if so, by whom. Hugh C. Wallace, the American ambassador to France, has been sitting in the peace conference sessions held in Paris and Ambassador John W. Davis at London.

San Remo, however, is situated in the territory of America's recently appointed diplomatic representative, Ambassador Robert Underwood Johnson, and it is doubtful if Ambassador Wallace will journey to San Remo and resume his place as an interested spectator at the conference table. It is possible that Mr. Johnson may take that post.

No instructions have been received at the American embassy at Paris in this connection from the state department.

It is understood in Paris that at the time of the conference President Deschanel will meet the king of Italy, the meeting being of an unofficial character. French, Italian and British squadrons, which are stationed at Villa Franche, will anchor in the San Remo roads while the conference is in session.
