WILL TEACH THRIFT

Automatic Receiving Tellers to be Placed in Many Schools Over the Entire County.

Thrift is to be inculcated in the coming generation of Tulsa county at an early age, for, with the beginning of the fall term in September, the convenient and up-to-date thrift system which was first put into operation into several schools that will be extended to most of the schools of the county as well as in the entire city schools, according to Mrs. Minnette Hedges, county superintendent. Automatic receiving tellers have already been ordered for the schools in Dixie, Sperry, Turley, and Okmulgee, and other towns will make arrangements this week for the purchase of tellers.
