SAND SPRINGS, Aug. 25.—Be-
cause of lack of funds in the treas-
ury of the school board, and the
pressing need for many repairs on
the school grounds of the city, peo-
ple are raising the question as to
the advisability of starting a bond
issue to secure the money needed.

According to officials, about \$20,000
will have to be raised to repair
the school grounds here, and this sum must be raised by bond
issue sooner or later. It has not yet
been decided whether this course
will be resorted to this fall, but in
view of the fact that the longer

the bond issue is delayed, the longer
it will take to raise the money.
