

# UNIVERSITY OF OKLAHOMA TRIUMPHS OVER AGGIES 36-0

## 'Dutch' Hill Sooner Halfback Is Sensational Star of Game

Carries Oval Over Line For Four of Five Touchdowns



### AGGIES BATTLE WELL

Lighter Farmers Offer Stubborn Resistance to Attack of Sooners

STILLWATER, Okla., Nov. 13.—The University of Oklahoma eleven easily won over the Oklahoma A. & M. college team on Sunday field here today in the annual game between the two state schools. The Sooners, Missouri valley champions, played true to form, scoring 16 points and holding the Aggies scoreless.

"Dutch" Hill, Sooner halfback, tallied four of the five touchdowns and was on the hurling end of a forward pass to Tyler which resulted in the fifth. Davis, quarterback, added three points by a placement kick.

**Many Passes Attempted.** The lighter Aggie eleven fought stubbornly. Despite extremely cold weather, a soft field and falling snow, both teams tried numerous forward passes. The Sooners completed six of 29 attempts for 29 yards. The Aggies made only 13 yards on the 46 completed in 21 tries.

Bonfires along the sidelines attracted the 3,000 spectators, who often left their seats for exercise to warm themselves against the cold. **Final Period.** Oklahoma university scored 16 points. A touchdown by Hill and goal and placement by Davis produced the university's scores. Poor punts by Ray of the A. & M. team gave the university boys all their chances to score.

**Second Period.** The Aggies braced during the second quarter and kept the Sooners from increasing the 10-point lead which they had carried into the first period. The Aggies had a chance to score when they received two consecutive and fumbled punts and reached the 8-yard line, only to be held for downs. Early for the university, attempted another placement but the oval missed. Score ended first half, 10-0, Aggies 2.

**Third Period.** The Sooners gathered in 13 points in the third period on touchdowns by Tyler and Hill. White kicked one goal and missed one. Hill, Sooner left half, made big gains through the Aggie line. Score ended third quarter, Oklahoma 23 Aggies 2.

**Fourth Period.** Oklahoma again scored 13 points and held the Aggies scoreless in the last quarter. The goals were made by two touchdowns by Hill, who made four of the five touchdowns of the game. White kicked goal and Davis missed. Forward passing featured in the last period, both teams using the play extensively and carrying the ball for large gains until it was intercepted by the upstart Aggies (6).
