

# TULSA AND MUSKOGEE TIE; KENDALL BEATS MO. MINES

## Tulsa Employs Aerial Attack; Muskogee Uses Straight Game

Thrilling Game Attended by Over 8,000 Grid Enthusiasts

### SCORES IN 3RD PERIOD

Muskogee Smashes Over Then Tulsa Passes for Its Touchdown

Tulsa and Muskogee high schools, ancient rivals, yesterday battled to a 7 to 7 tie at Lee stadium, in one of the most thrilling games ever recorded in Tulsa gridiron annals and played under ideal football conditions.

Over 8,000 persons, probably the largest crowd that ever attended a scholastic game in Oklahoma saw the crimson and cream battle the green and white in 40 minutes of intense, exciting, brilliant football. Cool weather adding zest to the playing of the game but a warm sun protecting spectators made it a perfect football day.

#### Elevens Evenly Matched.

The game was battle of open and straight football and the tie score were.

Indicated its closeness and how evenly matched the contending elevens Tulsa played its greatest football of the year. Defeated once and tied twice, Muskogee in its second game playing an unbeaten favored team, the oil city has brought their 1920 season to a fitting close. Their frequent and successful use of the aerial attack was the feature of their play and it was to their ability to make use of this offensive but dangerous style of offensive play that resulted in their touchdown. Tulsa fought hard and well. Twice they held Muskogee for downs on their own five-yard line. After Muskogee had recovered and kicked goal in the third period Tulsa came back and before the expiration of that period tied the score—sufficient evidence of their fighting ability.

#### Muskogee Powerful.

Muskogee's powerful eleven, repulsed in the first half by Tulsa, lugged the oval from the middle of the field for a touchdown in the early minutes of the third period and showed superiority over their opponents in straight football.

Muskogee suffered heavily from one penalty. After Woods had returned a punt in the fourth period from his own 40-yard line to Tulsa's 35-yard line he was called back and his team penalized 15 yards for holding. This was their last opportunity to score.

Toward the close of the game Tulsa began a march down the field that ended with the final whistle with the ball in their possession on the 20-yard line.

Tulsa completed six passes in 10 attempts for a total of 80 yards, while Muskogee's only three passes were incomplete. Captain C. Muskoogee twice intercepted Tulsa passes.

Muskogee made 12 first downs and Tulsa 13. Muskogee was held for down 10 times and Tulsa nine, indicating the closeness of the game.

#### Clean Game.

Despite the closeness and importance of the game, it was cleanly played, the penalties being inflicted for technical violations of the rules and not for undue roughness.

Mike Rutherford's catch of Ruppert's pass which started Tulsa in touch down, the brilliant all-around play of Shesher and Quillier and the offensive play of Hughes and Ruppert featured for Tulsa. For Muskogee, White's splendid play; Carter's snatching of Tulsa passes; Woods' ground gatting and the effective offensive work of Dick and Pinney were the most important factors in their play.

## TEXAS BEATS AGGIES

University Wins Southwestern Title by Defeating Longhorn Aggies 7 to 3.

AUSTIN, Nov. 25.—Texas university won the football championship and established the strongest claim to the southwestern title by defeating Texas A. & M. eleven here today by a score of 7 to 3. The Longhorns claim the southwestern title because Arkansas University, the only other undefeated member of the conference, was held to a scoreless tie today by Rice Institute. Texas defeated Rice 21 to 0.

The game opened with the Aggies putting from first down and after an exchange of punts and two runs they put the ball on Texas 12-yard line. Morris made a successful place kick from this point at the beginning of the second quarter. Texas then started a series of forward passes and cross-cuts that ended with the ball in the end zone. The Aggies gave up, where the Longhorns hung on to yards and in the fourth quarter Texas tore through the Aggie line with a series of plays that ended with Dominguez crossing the line for a touchdown. The ability of the Texas backs to return Higginbotham's long punts offset to a considerable extent the superiority of his drives.
