 Douglas, Chamber of Commerce Secretary, Resources Kendall

Pledging the support of the chamber of commerce and promising its cooperation to Henry Kendall colleague in its announced plans to substantially enlarge its scope of activities and usefulness as one of the southwest's educational institutions, Clarence B. Douglas, managing director of the chamber of commerce, Monday wrote to Dr. L. C. Walters of Okmulgee, state clerk of the Presbyterian synod of Oklahoma, commending the proposed campaign for an endowment fund of \$2,000,000.

CONTRACT IS LET FOR COUNTY HOME

Low Bid of \$63,000 Is \$2,000 Less Than Estimate.

Contract for the construction of the Tulsa farm home was let Monday by the board of county commissioners to the firm of I. J. Buck of this city on a bid of \$63,000, about \$2,000 less than the estimate prepared by the county engineer's office.

Two weeks ago three bids were received but because the lowest was \$72,000 the commissioners rejected it for bids and at the meeting yesterday the former lowest bid was reduced to \$63,000.

The county farm home, as planned by the commissioners, will have sufficient capacity to take care of all county patients, and is to be constructed on a large farm eight miles southeast of the city, recently obtained by the commissioners through the sale of the old county farm south of the fair grounds. The successful bidder yesterday announced that work on the building would begin within a short time and would be completed by June 1.

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SAPULPANS FREED OF THEFT CHARGE

Tabor and Herndon Found Not Guilty of Taking Shoes.

Several boxes of shoes were sold, he admitted, and he was later questioned by John Willard, special agent of the Frisco railway, relative to his possession of property stolen from the railroad. His explanation was that the defendants had left the shoes with him for sale.
