Will Represent This City
for Realtors at June
National Meeting

MAY WIN SILVER CUP

Once "Orated" in City Boost-
ing Contest but His Tales
Were Laughed Out

At the national convention of real estate boards to be held in Chicago in June a silver cup will be for one who wins the property of the exchange whose spokesman delivers the best five-minute talk about the virtues of his home town.

His Stories Once Laughed At.
Maurice J. Glass was chosen to represent the Tulsa exchange in this contest at the Thursday noonday luncheon and he will deliver this afternoon providing it fails to Tulsa to be one of the 15 cities on the entry list. Glass represented the local exchange in a similar contest at Kansas City last year but the stories he told about Tulsa, although true, were considered such "whoppers" by the judges that he was laughed out of the decision. He told the exchange Thursday that he was endeavoring to be more conservative this year.

INJUNCTION MODIFIED

Court Allows One Alleged Liquor Dealer to Take Padlock Off Door Pending Trial.

Finding neither the state nor federal law requires a bond to be given by a person whose place of business is closed by temporary injunction as an alleged liquor joint and that such an action begun by the state does not preclude a court order closing such store if it can be shown the place is a legitimate business venture, Judge Redmond S. Cole in district court Thursday afternoon modified the closing order issued on a temporary injunction two weeks ago against the North Side drug store, 105 North Main street. The owner of the store, G. W. Herford, was allowed to remove the padlock placed there by the sheriff's office and will be allowed to operate as a drug store until further court orders.

This drug store, with several others, was closed on complaint of the county attorney's office, upon an affidavit and temporary injunction, in which it is alleged Herford was maintaining a place where intoxicating liquor, specifically Jamaica Ginger, was sold for other than medicinal purposes.

Negro Trooper Is Killed.
LEAVENWORTH, Kan., March 24.—George Long, a negro soldier of the army service school detachment at Fort Leavenworth, was shot and killed by Charles McNeal, a fellow trooper, following an altercation over the loan of a cigar. McNeal was placed in the guard house. Long came from Augusta, Ga., and McNeal from Oklahoma City.

Auto License Law to Be Enforced April 1

All auto owners who have not before April 1 secured the 1921 license or made application for such license will be arrested and prosecuted as delinquents, according to James Fouts, license clerk in the sheriff's office and recognized by the state highways department as agent of the department in this county. The time limit on applications was February 1, but following the practice in many counties in the state, Fouts and other officials have allowed additional time in which to make license applications. Fouts will put one agent in this field beginning next month and with the assistance of the police department arrest and prosecute all persons operating cars without the 1921 license.
