When the New York boxing commission announced that Johnny Kilbane, featherweight champion, and Johnny Wilson, king of the middleweights, would have to defend their titles within a given space of time or forfeit them to the best challengers, it caused the two non-combatants of pugilism to come out of their corners and announce that they were willing to fight. The New York boxing commission is strong enough to back up a fight across and the boxers know it. Thus the possibility of championship battles in both divisions is very good.

Just who the best challengers are is a matter of conjecture, but there are at least two bouts on this week's schedule that will furnish very good foes for both champions.

One brings Vincent (Pippin) Martin and Jack Sharkey together in New York, and the other brings Jock Malone and Johnny Karr together in Columbus.

Kilbane's Successor.

Martin is a sensational young scrapper, developed in New York in the last two years. His success in the hemped arena has been phenomenal, and in his last few fights he has made such a splendid showing that he has been picked by most experts to succeed Kilbane in the featherweight throne, a place held by the Clevelandener since he beat Abe Attell out in the old Vernon, Cal., arena in 1912. Martin has every requirement, as the experts say, for a champion. After seeing him fight once Kilbane would not talk business when Martin was mentioned as his next fighter. One shot at Martin will whip Sharkey decisively and it is in the cards for him to do so, Kilbane may be forced into such a match.

Malone established his right to meet Wilson the other night in Aurora when he handed Bryan Downey, boxing lesson. Downey floored Malone in the first round with a dangerous right mitted but after a punchless bout served as a punchless bag for the fast, clever, shifty St. Paul scrapper.

Benny Leonard has three fights booked within the next month, but he will not appear in ring rigs this week. Greh meets his foe June 25 when he boxes Hugh Walker in Pittsburgh. They have met before and strange as it may seem to those who do not follow boxing, Leonard is a heavyweight. It was a good fight. Walker keeps after the speedy Greh and makes the bout interesting. No doubt Greh will outpoint Hugh but theistic followers of the dark city of Pennsylvania will be given a fairly interesting entertainment.

Demand Return Bout

Billy Britton, a good middleweight who has been winning consistently all year, has met Tiger Flowers, Johnny Klesch and others of that type in the past. In the American Legion in Atchison, Kansas, Friday night in a scheduled six-round contest with Ed Warner of Lenawee, Ohio, he won his bout. They met again Saturday afternoon at McNaughton's, June 12 to 5. The Gophers went wild in the early rounds and started up an impressive lead from Randolph.
