Republican Victories in Elmira and Dutchess County. ELMIRA, N. Y., March 2.—The result of the Elmira charter election was almost a complete turn over. Troy Goes Democratic. TROY, N. Y., March 2.—Dennis J. Whelan, Democratic candidate for mayor, was elected by a majority of more than 5,000.

Overwhelmingly Republican. CANANDAIGUA, N. Y., March 2.—The election in this county went overwhelmingly Republican. Charles C. Sacker carries the town of Canadawaga by the vote of a majority of 480.

Kansas Wants Harrison. TOPEKA, Kan., March 2.—The Republican state central committee met and called the state convention to elect delegates to the national convention.

A Georgia Bill Club. SAVANNAH, March 2.—An enthusiastic meeting here the first Hill club in southeastern Georgia was formed, embracing in membership many men prominent in professional and business life and politics.

Double Tragedy at a Primary. FAYETTE CORNER, Tenn., March 2.—John Rogers and his son, Republicans, attempted to vote at a Democratic primary here and were shot dead by Sam Hunter, who escaped.

All Republicans Elected. UTICA, N. Y., March 2.—The most exciting charter election in the history of the entire Republic terminated in the election of the entire Board of Supervisors.

A Surprise for Batavia. BATAVIA, N. Y., March 2.—The Republicans elected a supervisor here for the first time in twelve years.

Reputed by His Father. JEFFERSONVILLE, Ind., March 2.—Rev. F. F. Kirkley, of Franklin, Ind., was committed to prison here on a two years' sentence for forgery.

Violence in Russia. LONDON, March 2.—The English special correspondent who is traveling in the Danube districts of Russia writes from Saratov that crimes of violence in the valley of the Volga are of frequent occurrence.

Violent as a Weapon. PARIS, March 2.—A French officer has submitted to the war ministry a rifle that will project a stream of vitriol for a distance of seventy meters.

LIVE WASHINGTON NEWS.

The Indian Appropriation Bill Finally Passes the House. The Superintendent of the School at Carlisle, Pa., Left in the Lurch—The Tariff and Silver Debate—Anti-Free Coinage Filibusters to Be Headed Off.

WASHINGTON, March 2.—The entire day was consumed in the senate by a further discussion of the Idaho case, the advocates of the claim of the contestant, Mr. Claggett, on both sides of the chamber having the floor.

The house devoted the day to the consideration of the Indian appropriation bill, which was finally passed after occupying the attention of the house for nearly ten days.

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The Tariff and Silver Debates. The debate on the tariff measures reported by the committee on ways and means will begin in the house next Tuesday.

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THE NEWS OF ALBANY.

O'Connor's Employers' Liability Bill Passed. ALBANY, March 2.—In the senate O'Connor's employers' liability bill was made a special order.

Mr. Mullin offered a resolution recommending the bill to the judiciary committee, and requested the committee to investigate during the next session.

Mr. O'Connor said the bill in England had been defeated by corporate interests which were trying to defeat it here.

Senator Cantor introduced a concurrent resolution urging New York's representatives in congress to vote for the purchase of the Temple farm at Yorktown, Va.

In the assembly Speaker Bush's state printing office bill was passed in favor of the floor. The vote was 73 to 25.
