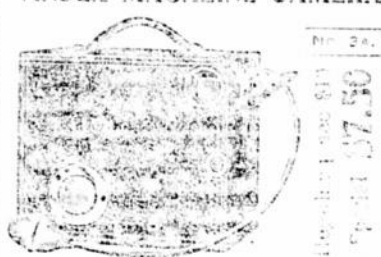

CUT TO PIECES BY TRAIN

Montana Section Hand Killed by Northern Pacific Train Near Bismarck.

Bismarck, N. D., March 30.—Micky McMahon or McMann, a section hand from Yellowstone county, Mont., was cut to pieces by a Northern Pacific train Thursday night at a point half a mile or so east of the Bismarck depot. McMahon was in route east from Montana, and probably stepped on the platform of the east-bound passenger train and fell off, being carried under the wheels. His body was badly mutilated. It was cut in two pieces at a point just above the hips, the legs being found in one place and the head and trunk several rods distant. The fragments of the body were scattered over a distance of probably an eighth of a mile. The head was badly battered and the man's death was probably instantaneous.

The body was found by Bernard O'Reilly, when coming in from the penitentiary. The authorities were notified and Coroner White brought in the remains. The dead man was probably forty years of age. Receipts and papers in his pocket showed that he had paid poll tax in Yellowstone county, Montana, and had worked on the section for the Northern Pacific at Big Horn, Mont.

So far as known, no one saw him take the train at this point.

N. Dak. at Pan American.

The Pan-American exhibits for the state will be in a handsome pagoda located between Connecticut and Texas in a fine location in the agricultural building. Space has also been secured in the mines and mining and dairy buildings for mineral and dairy products, which will be presented in attractive forms.

It has been erroneously stated in state papers that the railroads had come to the rescue in handsome shape. Except the Soo line the roads positively refused to furnish transportation for either men or exhibits, which largely adds to the expense of the commission. The Soo line has generously offered free transportation as far as its line extends and other courtesies which are greatly appreciated. All articles or displays loaned by private parties will constitute a part of the state exhibit any diplomas, medals, etc., won are awarded to the individual, not the state. This should be an incentive to those who are thinking of assisting the exhibit in this way.

Among the souvenirs to be given away will be small silken sacks filled with No. 1 hard, and other attractive features will be added from time to time.

The \$10 prize for best design for state button or emblem will be awarded Monday. Quite a large number of designs have been received, among them many attractive features.

Cavalier and Ramsey counties are getting up attractive county exhibits and others are being agitated.

Demise of an Old Time Resident of Stutsman County After a Short Illness.

D. L. Gray died Saturday at his residence in this city. The end came at about 12:30. He had been ill just a week. Until Wednesday it was thought that he was not seriously sick and would be around in a few days. Complications of pneumonia and pleurisy set in and he continued to grow worse until the end came.

Mr. Gray was born in New York state. From there he moved to Colorado, coming to North Dakota in 1889. He was superintendent of I. C. Wade's stock farm for a number of years. For late years he has been a contractor and builder. He was about to build a warehouse for a Medina firm.

He leaves a wife and seven children to mourn his loss. The family all live in the city. Will arrived from Casselton a few hours before his death. The children are: Will, James, Mrs. Dunsmore, Davina, Lillie, Frances and Margaret. A brother resides in Peoria and another in Yonkers, N. Y.

Mr. Gray was a member of the Salvation Army, having joined a year since. Formerly he had been a Presbyterian. He belonged to the Yeomen lodge.

GIVEN A WARM WELCOME.

Boers Arriving at Lisbon Treated Better Than English Envoys.

Madrid, April 2.—Dispatches received here from Lisbon are rigorously censored. Letters which have reached here say the Boers who arrived at Lisbon on board transports Friday from Delagoa Bay were accorded a splendid reception, contrasting with the coolness of the popular reception of the ministers, headed by Earl Carrington, sent to Lisbon to formally notify King Charles of the death of Queen Victoria and the accession of King Edward VII to the throne of Great Britain and Ireland. The hour selected for the landing of the Boers was kept secret, but, nevertheless, a large crowd was present and acclaimed the travelers, a majority of whom were European volunteers. The party, numbering 700 persons, was escorted to their quarters by Portuguese infantry.

NEW JERSEY FOREST FIRES.

Town of Winslow Narrowly Escapes Destruction.

Hammonton, N. J., April 2.—One of the most extensive forest fires that has visited this section of the state is raging in the big woods north of this city. The fire reached a point just east of the town of Winslow and for several hours it was feared that it would be wiped out. Men, women and children succeeded by backfiring in turning the flames to the north of the town. While the men threw up trenches to keep the fire away women and children carried their household goods to places of safety in the fields and are guarding them as a change in the wind is feared. Several frame buildings, about 5,000 acres of big timber and thousands of cords of wood have been consumed. Many narrow escapes of the fire fighters have been reported.
