Milwaukee, April 20 .- In a box in a safety deposit vault engaged a few weeks ago by a servant girl was found over \$20,000 in cash and bonds and a number of warehouse receipts, certifying to the storage of thousands of dol-

lars worth of valuable goods. This property, which was brought to light Monday, is believed to be a part of the assets of Marcus Kaatz, a Chicago bankrupt cap manufacturer, who disappeared suddenly last year when creditors commenced an investigation and Edward Sperner, stood up with as to the nature of the security of the Chicago man's financial standing. ## SEEDING COMPARISONS

FOR THE SAME PERIODS IN APRIL 1904-3-2.

A summary of the weather and crop situation for the state for the weeking ending April 18, 1904 is made by the government weather bureau at Bismarck as follows: The present season is opening more unfavorably than any for a long time past. While some little seeding has been done, mostly in the central and western portions of the state, still as a rule, nothing has been done in the thickly settled counties toward putting in the crops.

On the 7th, 8th and 9th of the present month a very severe storm passed over the state, being especialy so in the eastern and southern sections, followed by unusually cold weather, and at the present time those portions are covered by snow ranging from a few inches to six and ten feet in depth, mainly in the shape of large drifts.
