RICH RUSSIAN GENERAL WORKS IN N. Y. GARAGE

Escaped Bolshevists And Fled To America, Leaving Fortune Behind

New York, Aug. 21.—Gen. George Y. d'Hedberg, who carries the scars of nine wounds received in the wars of Russia from the Russo-Japanese through the world war, when his last command was with the White army under Gen. Yudneltch, is employed in a Bronx garage. His estates, one in Russia and the other in France, have been sold, and now he is depending on his knowledge of motor mechanics to make a living.

In the historical drive on Petrograd with the White army d'Hedberg was taken a prisoner, and for nine months lay wounded in the prison fortress of SS. Peter and Paul. When it was believed that there was no chance for his recovery, and while he was danserously ill and his wounds still unhealed, he was thrown into the streets to die. Had it not been for a former kindness to a guard he probably would not have lived.

The guard notified the general's relatives. They nursed d'Hedberg back to life, and then smuggled him out of the country to Finland, where after semaining for some time in hiding, he got on a ship and reached the United States. His properties were gone, and when he landed in New York he had liftle money left.

However, he had made a friend in Russia during the war. That was Eric Moraller, who was a Y. M. C. A. secretary. When Moraller knew d'Hedberg over there the general was a person of means. His estates were intact and he owned eleven automobiles and employed a chauffeur for each. The fact that he did not permit any of the chauffers to work on the motors benefited him when he reached America for, having done all of the repair work for years on his own cars, he was qualified to repair other cars. His knowledge of foreign cars and parts was important, for while there are many foreign cars in this country, there are comparatively few American mechanics who understand them.

Finds "Y" Secretary.

The general hunted up Moraller through the international committee of the Y. M. C. A., and learned that the war secretary was working as executive secretary of the Bronx Union, Y. M. C. A. Secretary Moraller speaks Russian, and he was a great help to the general in finding employment.

Several offers were made for his vervices as a mechanic by agencies handling foreign cars, but the fact that he could not speak English lessened the value of his services. The general speaks Russian, German, French and a number of dislects of eastern Europe, but he never had studied English.

Job in Garage.

Finally, the Elsey Motor company found a place for the general in the repair department. The company conducts a big garage, and found a valuable man in the former commander of a part of the White army.

But the the general is not altogether satisfied with his lot. He has enrolled in the hight school at the Bronx union Y. M. G. A. to learn English. He is in the early forties and is starting life over again—working his way through the achool of democracy.
