The preparation of the soil in the garden is a very important consideration. In the first place the soil should be good and well drained. That is, it should not be where water will collect, and it should be so prepared that during heavy rains. And yet it should be so sloping that all the water will run off.	6. Parsnip. 7. Flowing is an essential part of the preparation, and if possible should be done in the fall. But as a general rule, the best vegetables which will often prevent this being necessary should be so prepared that they should be getting the full benefit of the winter freezing. amount of manure that should be applied depends considerably on how well it is rotted. It is probably a good practice to apply a small amount every year, and to dig it in thoroughly before the land is plowed.

The land should be plowed quite deep for garden vegetables, but should not be plowed much deeper in the spring than it has been the year before, because it is not advisable to expose very much new soil, as the plant food in this is not so available, and the plants will not grow so well in it as if it had been exposed for some time. In this region there is no trouble about growing vegetables if any consideration at all is given them.

**What to Plant.**

4. Lettuce, early, Grand Rapids, one-third row; late, Black Seeded Bliss, one-third row.

5. Onion, Red Westfield, 1 row
