The city should own its own sewage and sewer plant to the point of its final disposition. The health of a city depends greatly upon the disposition of the sewage, and this is subject to sanitary legislation. Under such circumstances, the city should not give away or sell its right to the absolute control of the sewage. It should own every pipe that it runs in and every gate therein, so that in time of necessity, or when there is danger of disease or epidemic, the city can control its disposal. If the sewage were to be given to some person or corporation, the city would have no control over it after it left the city limits, and the neglect of the parties at some period or crisis might endanger the health of the citizens. Mr. Daly was of the opinion that the proper thing for the Council to do was to first consider the different methods of disposing of the sewage and then select the best for the health of the citizens.
