Resume of the Fruit Crops and Markets. Good Outlook for the Season of 1896. Local Markets Develop Few Changes of Any Importance

Until population increases in Southern California to a point large enough to support general manufacturing industries this must remain as at present, a section dependent for the most part on agriculture for its prosperity. With the sharp competition existing for the breadstuffs trade of the world, cereal crops will not pay large profits. This state may, therefore, be considered very happy in its adaptibility to horticulture. Ten acres of fruit are easily worth as much as 160 to 200 acres of wheat, barley or corn. In this state no section has prospered in the last five or six years outside of the few where fruit raising is the leading industry. In northern California Santa Clara county is one of the most prosperous, and the reason is discoverable in the following taken from a recent issue of the San Jose Mercury, showing shipments of fruits in pounds for two years:

As to the situation, California fruit grow-As to the situation, California fruit growers ought to do well. The orange crop, while perhaps it will fall 1500 cars short of last year, has been nearly all marketed at good prices. The crops of raisms and dried fruits of last year are nearly all disposed of, so that the new crop will come on a bare market. The frosts of the early part of March did more or less damage to early apricots, almonds and cherries. Reports are generally to the effect that the fruit crops will not be heavy. It would therefore seem as if fruit growers would be paid for good care bestowed on their crop. High grade fruit ought to be in demand and to bring good prices. Low grade fruit will always bankrupt both the producer and the merchant.

Treasury Statement

Washington, March 31.—Today's statement of the condition of the treasury shows: Avaliable cash balance \$271,111,211; gold reserve, \$128,713,709.

During the last few months neither the customs receipts nor those from internal revenue sources have come up to the expectations, and little improvement its anticipated in the near future. On November 30 last, when the latest departmental estimates were prepared for congress, the increase in the receipts in customs during the five months of the fiscal year over those for the same period in 1894 was about \$12,000,000 and a further increase was confidently expected. Since that time, however, the increase amounts to about only \$500,000.

New York, March 31.—The Evening Post's London financial cable says: The approach of the Easter holidays assists to maintain the stagnation in stocks. The exchange will be closed on Saturday. The markets today were irregular and featureless. Americans were steady to firm. Louisville opened flat on the supreme court decision but it was quickly discovered that this was really a bull point, and the price closed firm at 31. The Chinese loan is a great success. It will probably be applied for three times over, but no announcement is yet made. The Paris and Berlin markets were still weak on the political rumors.




