There was an unusually large attendance at the Friday Morning club yesterday, the subjects under discussion being The Technique of the Short Story, which was the title of the paper presented by Charles Dwight Willard, followed by Mrs. Margaret Collier Graham, who read an essay on The Novel, written by David Swing. There was an interesting subject, Four Years of Novel Reading, by Mrs. Frank Gibson, who showed that the old idea of novel reading, being regarded as merely a pastime, had evolved to an educational basis. It has been taken up in different institutions of learning as a regular course of literature. Berkeley was the first American institution to adopt the plan. Dr. Phelps in the past year has introduced it into Yale college. The books are regarded from the critic's standpoint. The main feature in this innovation being the opportunity of studying types of humanity. The work at Yale is an experiment, and it depends upon the present class to establish its success or failure. At Backworth, a colliery district of England, in connection with the college extension, the work has been tried and proved most satisfactory, it is to enlist the interest of systematic novel reading at one novel per month. Mrs. Gibson outlined the course of the work at the high school of this city. The morning was brought to a close by the report of Mrs. Willard, who attended the womans' parliament at Santa Ana as a delegate of the Friday Morning club.
