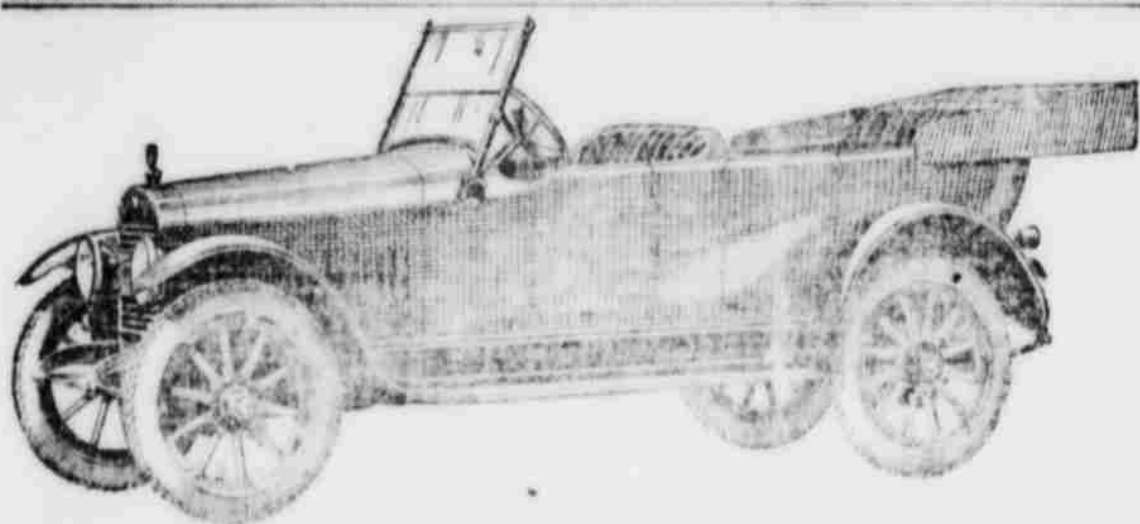

REPAIRS TO ELECTRIC PLANT BE COMPLETED BY LATE THIS EVENING

Repairs will have been completed at the City Light plant by tonight, declared an official of the company Saturday afternoon, insuring customary service, following a "blow-out" which seriously hampered the lighting system of Amarillo Friday morning.

Since the accident occurred a number of experts have been at work on the big turbine and have repaired it so that it will be in regular working order by night. No expert will be called from the factory, it was stated.

The City Light Company stated Saturday that with this repair the equipment will take care of the present needs of the service, but that the company some time ago sent for another turbine to be used for a reserve and to supplement heavy drains by unusual causes. The new turbine has never been received, although ordered more than a year ago. The present equipment is, however, sufficient under ordinary circumstances and usual electric consumption, it was stated.
