RETAILER ALLOWED TWO CENTS PROFIT ON SUGAR

Two cents per pound profit on sugar is held as sufficient for the retailer in a statement issued yesterday by the local Fair Price committee.

The following statement was given out by W. C. Pope, chairman of the commission:

"I have had several inquiries as to what is a fair profit for a dealer to make upon sugar and in reply I would state that the board has held that one cent per pound for a jobber and two cents per pound for a retailer is a fair profit upon this commodity and anybody selling for more than that is laying themselves liable to prosecution under the Lever Act."

HIGH RECORD FOR FEDERAL RESERVE BANK

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 7.—Earnings of the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond, according to figures available today were slightly more than 88 per cent on its paid-in capitalization during 1919, smashing all previous records since the institution was established.

The bank enjoyed earnings of approximately \$3,880,000 on its paid-in capital of \$4,500,000. The previous year the bank earned \$2,600,000 on the same capitalization.

ENGLISH PROMOTER SAYS DEMSEY WILL NOT MEET CARPENTIER AS PLANNED

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—That Jack Dempsey could not meet Georges Carpentier at Tijuana, Mexico, January 4, was the statement made today by Charles B. Coakran, London fight promoter, who said that Carpentier was already under contract to Coakran. The Englishman, who promoted the Carpenter was already in London and who is now in Chicago declared today that his contract with the Frenchman was binding and that Carpenter and M. Desvamps, his manager, would be liable if it was broken.

He reiterated that he would not offer Dempsey more than \$200,000 plus a weekly retainer of \$50,000.

Women's Hotel Planned

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—The large hotel E. America exclusively for women, designed for business women and those of moderate means, will be erected in the heart of New York on a site purchased today by the promoting company.

The building is to consist of seventeen stories on a plot and will contain approximately 700 rooms to be rented at rates of \$1 and \$2 a day.

Dieguez Gains Ninth
With Munitions

EL PASO, Jan. 7.—General M. M. Dieguez, commander of military operations in the northern zone of Mexico, left Mexico City for Chihuahua City yesterday according to telegram received today by Albert Ruis, assistant acting consul General for Mexico at El Paso. General Dieguez was reported as bringing back with him considerable war material and equipment, the nature of which was not given.

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5 STORY HOME FOR AMERICAN LEGION IS PLAN

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—Tentative plans prepared

The proposed American Legion building will consist of five stories and basement, according to plans drawn by R. B. Crowe and R. B. Crawford, local architects and presented to the regular semi-monthly meeting of the local post Tuesday night.

A meeting of the building committee will be held Friday night at 8 o'clock to discuss details of the campaign that is to be inaugurated in the interest of the proposed permanent home for Hanson Post. This committee is headed by S. E. McMahon and a full attendance of all members is urged.

The plans for the proposed building briefly are:

General Description of Building.

Reinforced concrete frame, with reinforced concrete floors; exterior walls brick backed up with hollow tile, stone or terra cotta trim; room partitions, 2" or 3" solid plaster reinforced with steel; all offices or rooms have outside exposure, with not less than two windows; two elevators for service from basement to roof; steam vapor heating system, using gas for fuel; coal room used in case of gas shortage.

Fifth Floor.

Upper part of ball and banquet hall; kitchen, 20'x20'; orchestra pit and service stair hall; athletic directors office, 16'x20'; locker room, 136 lockers; shower room, 5 shower heads; toilet room; gymnasium, 40'x60'; elevator and stair hall.

Fifth Floor.

Storage room, 20'x20'; service room in connection with kitchen of floor below, service stair and dumb waiter; roof garden, 40'x10'; tile floor; elevator and stair pent house.

First Floor.

Six store rooms, 20'x60'; elevator and stairs hall, 16' wide.

Second Floor.

Eighteen offices and reception rooms; eight single office rooms; 1 suite, 4 rooms, (total of 44 rooms); public toilets, ladies and gentlemen; elevator and stair hall.

Third Floor.

Business office of legion; music room, 20'x20'; reading room, 20x40'; gas tire place; lounge room, 20'x40'; billiard room, 20'x40'; space for 3 tables ball and banquet room, 40'x60'; two stories, 450 seats; stage and seats movable; storage room off ball room; for stage and chairs, etc.; service room, 20'x20', connected to kitchen

Fourth Floor.

Some 40 second floor, (total of all office rooms, 83.)

RAILWAY ADMINISTRATION PROMISES CARS TO MOVE PANHANDLE CROPS; SITUATION DECLARED TO BE ACUTE

The inability to get the years crop moved last fall, due to a shortage of cars in the Panhandle, was temporarily relieved by the efforts of the Secretary of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce through Congressman Marvin Jones, and it was believed at the time that the situation had been cleared up. It has, however, again become acute and it is now almost impossible to get cars to move the remainder of the enormous crop raised on the plains last year. It is claimed.
