SAYS WOMEN SHOULD FORM NO NEW PARTY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—"How does it feel?" Mrs. George Bass was asked after she was informed she had been appointed a member of the Democratic executive committee on arrangements in Washington. "To know you are one of the most important cogs in the great machinery of the Democratic party?"

First to See Equality

"Every Democratic woman is a cog in not only the machinery, but the policy and program of the party," she answered with one of her inimitable sayings. "The thing that interests me most is that the leaders of my party see into have realized first the absolute equality of women. I don't think they long to understand that already there are 29,000,000 women in the United States who can vote for the next president. This is five times more than the entire A. E. P., to which the Republican party seems to be looking with great anxiety."

Accept Duty Seriously

"But will the women vote, even if they have the privilege?" she was asked.

"Certainly they will," she answered promptly. "Women have always accepted a duty very seriously, whether they took it upon themselves or it was thrust upon them. Even the most frivolous and unthinking of us have this conception of duty. The vote of the women of the United States will elect the next president, and to them and them only must be given the responsibility of the next few years, which mean reconstruction."

Against New Party

To the question, "Could not women wield a greater influence if they formed a new party?" Mrs. Bass replied:

"I think that would be the greatest tragedy that could come in the case of women. When women form a new party they involuntarily put up before brain, and lay themselves open to the accusation of being able to work only along the one old way of femininity."

The department of Secretarial Studies presents in an interesting manner all the basic principles underlying business.

At the present time there are two hundred and eighty girls enrolled in this department at the College of Industrial Arts, fifty-two of whom have entered this course since Christmas.
