

## BAILEY SERIOUSLY CONSIDERING INVITATION TO SPEAK IN AMARILLO DURING CONVENTION, IS BELIEF

That Joseph W. Bailey, who has been invited to speak at the Fourth Annual Convention of the Buyers and Sellers Livestock Association, February 24, 25 and 26, is seriously considering the invitation, is the belief of those who are interested in bringing the former senator to Amarillo for an address.

Mr. Bailey will speak at Gainesville, February 18, but according to information received here, he plans to return to Washington to appear before the supreme court. Because of this apparent conflict of dates, it is believed Mr. Bailey is taking considerable time before replying to the Amarillo invitation. It was pointed out here that Mr. Bailey probably could get his case advanced a few days at Washington or he could have some of his assistants to plead it in case of emergency.

## POLICE WILL BEGIN ARRESTING MOTORISTS WITHOUT NEW PLATES

The police department will begin tomorrow morning arrests of persons who have failed to pay their 1920 automobile license, according to announcement made yesterday by Chief of Police C. M. Davis. He said that the new number plates must be displayed on the front of the car. The fact that one has paid his license will not excuse him when he fails to display the number plate upon the car, according to Mr. Davis.

According to law, all automobiles license should have been paid by January 1, but due to the extraordinary amount of work required by the payment of taxes at the county tax collector's office, car owners were given until this date. As the payment of all property taxes ceased on January 11, car owners have had fifteen additional days in which to pay their 1920 license.
